French 4/5 Standard Level

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Bonjour! Et bienvenue...

Félicitations! You have chosen to embark on a two year journey that will end with a measurable degree of French fluency and general knowledge of French and La Francophonie. Because the International Baccalaureate is concerned with your ability to think critically about a variety of topics in at least two languages, your competencies will be measured through your ability to express complex ideas in French. You will be awarded points for your ability to effectively communicate these ideas in French in both orally and writing, which means that we will be conducting our class entirely in French.

Our units of study will be organized by 6 overarching themes:

Identity: what does it mean to be human?

Experiences: explore and recite the events, experiences and travel of your life.

Sharing our planet: Explore the difficulties encountered by individuals and communities, and the possibilities of the modern world.

Human ingenuity: Explore the ways that creativity and human innovation influence our world.

Social Organization: Explore the ways that people organize, and the systems of organization around common interests.

At the end of your 2 years of IBDP French, you will be able to:

- Understand straightforward recorded or spoken information on the topics studied.
- Understand authentic written texts related to the topics studied and that use mostly everyday language.
- Communicate orally in order to explain a point of view on a designated topic.
- Describe with some detail and accuracy experiences, events and concepts.
- Produce texts where the use of register, style, rhetorical devices and structural elements are generally appropriate to the audience and purpose.
- Demonstrate interaction that usually flows coherently, but with occasional limitations. Engage in conversations on the topics studied, as well as related ideas.
- Demonstrate some intercultural engagement with the target language and culture(s).

Required materials

Each day, you should bring the following to class:

- a blue or black pen or pencil, a red pen and a highlighter
- the class textbook: Oxford IB DP French B
- a 2" binder, or section of a larger binder, with loose leaf paper
- a charged chromebook
- *optional – green pen, note cards

Attendance

- In order to be considered present, you must be *in your seat working on the warm up* when the bell rings. Any student in the room, but not in his or her seat, when the bell rings, will be considered tardy.

Students are recommended to continue the following French level after earning a B or better.

Course Grade:

1. Classwork (20%)

❖ **Classeur (notebook):** daily warm up, classroom activities and notes

❖ **Participation:** active participation in French and appropriate behavior are expected daily

2. Homework (10%)

Daily assignments will be essential to your success.

3. Quizzes (*interros*) (30%)

We will have announced and unannounced quizzes over the grammar and vocabulary elements we have been studying. These will be straightforward paper and pen quizzes. *Students may choose to retake ONE quiz per quarter, and the new grade will completely replace the old grade. This retake must be done no later than two weeks before the end of the quarter. If you cannot tell me the name of the quiz or the material on it, you will not be allowed to retake the quiz.*

4. Tests/Performances of Understanding (40%)

Performance assessments are students' opportunity to show how (s)he can communicate in French. Some of these assessments will mimic the IB exam, and all will help you display the competencies essential to success on your exam.
