

OELMA Leadership-in-Action Award Checklist

Description: The OELMA Leadership-in-Action Award recognizes an Ohio school library media specialist who pursues active leadership roles in their school district, in OELMA, and/or in national professional organizations (e.g. AASL, ALA). This award honors OELMA members who demonstrate an ongoing commitment to leadership in the school library profession.

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Nominee's narrative (500 words) and supporting documentation must provide substantive examples from "Lead Beyond the Library" and at least one other topic chosen from the following <u>Ohio's Library Guidelines for Librarians</u> (2021) strands: equity, literacies, partnerships, and quality schools. State the specific guideline used in the examples.

Nominator's narrative (250 words) must provide at least one substantive example from the following <u>Ohio's Library Guidelines for Librarians</u> (2021) strands: equity, literacies, partnerships, and quality schools. Use a specific guideline from the topic you select to describe your nominee's strengths.

Equity

Each child has access to relevant and challenging academic experiences and educational resources necessary for success across race, gender, ethnicity, language, disability, family background or income.
