- Development of recruitment flyers/information
- Consent form language
- Provide the voice of the participant

Members of the CCERC believe that conducting community engaged research is essential to include:

- 1. Diverse communities
- 2. User friendly, culturally sensitive practices and measures
- 3. Local interpretation of results
- 4. Trust and respect with community
- 5. More likely to lead to improved community health
- 6. Partnerships and coalitions that help mobilize resources and influence systems, change relationships among partners and serves as a catalyst for changing policies, programs and practices

While the expertise of the CCERC is often sought out by developmental applicants and awardees through CFAR Think Tanks, review meetings and grant writing workshops, there are many senior faculty members who may not be aware of the services and expertise that the CCERC provides.
