Abstract: Abstract should be written with 12 font size, Times New Roman, single line spacing. **Objective, method** and **findings** must be summarized in this section.

Keywords: This section should contain a maximum 5 words, separated by commas.

INTRODUCTION (Times New Roman, 12 font size, bold, all caps)

The introduction section should (1) present the scope and objective of the paper and state the problem, (2) briefly review the pertinent literature, (3) describe the methods, and (4) provide an overview of the main research results.

METHODOLOGY

The methodology must be clearly stated and described in sufficient detail or with appropriate references. The author shall explain the research question, describe the research framework, and outline the methods applied in detail. This section should highlight why the particular research question is relevant to theory and practice, and why the chosen method(s) is(are) suited to the problem.

RESULTS

The arguments and findings are described in detail in this section.

CONCLUSIONS

Conclusions should include (1) the principles and generalizations inferred from the results, (2) any exceptions, problems or limitations of the work, (3) theoretical and/or practical implications of the work, and (4) conclusions drawn and recommendations.

References should be cited within your extended abstract using APA (American Psychological Association) style. Examples of reference formats are given here. For additional information on

GENERAL GUIDELINES

The extended abstract must contain the following sections: **abstract and keywords, introduction, methodology, findings, conclusion, and references**. Sections can be named differently, and subsections may be included.

The extended abstract shall be written in font Times New Roman, with single line spacing, and 12 font size. It should contain a minimum of 500 and a maximum of 1000 words. The extended abstracts can contain figures, tables and/or images which are not included in the word count. The references are not included in the word count. The page format should be A4 page size with margins of 2.5 cm from the right, left, top and bottom. **Page limit is maximum 2.**

The supporting figures, tables and images of the results (**no more** than two figures and two tables) may be included in the extended abstract.

All the tables, images and figures should be centered. The figures and images must be numbered and figure headers should be placed under the figure or image. Similarly, the tables should also be numbered and the table header should be placed at the top. Any references of the tables, figures and images should be presented right under the tables, figures and images in the form of the author's surname and publication year.
