Course Description: This course is designed to help you to acquire the enduring understandings of the key events, individuals, and issues that have contributed to the shaping of the contemporary United States and ourselves as individual members of this society, or simply, how we've become who we've become.

Course Objectives:

- Explain, analyze, and evaluate the political, economic, social, and intellectual characteristics of the U.S.
- Demonstrate an understanding of American history with specific reference to the events, individuals, and issues that have had major influences on public policy and social movements.
- Evaluate and interpret sources of historical information.
- Analyze and compare multiple historical sources to develop empathy for different perspectives.
- Improve reading, writing, research and communication skills.
- Develop a lifelong interest and the skills to participate as an informed citizen in society.

Classroom Policies (Subject to Change)

Attendance: Please attend class as there are invaluable experiences that occur in class that cannot be made-up (discussions, debates, simulations, group work, etc.). If you are absent, you are responsible for identifying what you missed (please check the files, calendar, course website, or a classmate to find out what you are still responsible for).

Tardies: Out of respect for each other and the limited time we share, please be seated and ready to work when the bell rings, otherwise you will be marked tardy. If you are tardy, please use the sign-in sheet.

Make-Up Work: Upon returning from an excused absence, you will have <u>up to one week</u> to make up any missed assignments, tests or presentations, or <u>two (2) school days</u> to make up a quiz or test. Make-up work/tests will only be accepted if absences are excused. It is the student's responsibility to schedule a time to do so outside of class time before or after school. Failure to do so will result in a zero for the quiz or test. <u>All work assigned prior to an absence is due the date of return</u>.

Late Work: To receive full-credit, quality work must be complete and turned in on time. Late work will be accepted for half-credit (50% of the points it would have received if turned in on-time) up to two weeks after its original due date. Work will be considered late if it is not turned in at the <u>beginning</u> of the period in the appropriate location.

Revisions: Projects or papers previously submitted on-time, graded and returned to you may be revised and re-submitted (within <u>two (2) weeks</u> of being graded/returned) for a maximum of one letter grade increase. Please make an effort to submit quality work on the first attempt.

Work Expectations: Please make an effort to submit quality work. This includes but is not limited to completing readings prior to class, proofreading your work for proper grammar and spelling, asking questions to clarify understandings, establishing contact with me or classmates for additional help, managing your time to prioritize preparation and work.

Grading: Students earn their grades based on achieving mastery of content knowledge and standards-based skills, submitting quality work, and participating in a supportive learning community (coming to class prepared, contributions to class, group work, adherence to classroom rules and expectations, etc.).

A portfolio file system will be kept in class to compile previous work that will be used to highlight your academic growth. Always keep your receipts! Do not throw away/recycle work that may be used to prove previous submittals and/or used as evidence of your growth.

Academic Honesty: Cheating and plagiarism does not help you nor your classmate(s). Both are strictly prohibited; refer to the Student Handbook for WHS policy. Learn how and take the time to cite professional literature and properly prepare to avoid engaging in dishonest academic behavior.
