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## Course Description

**γραφή** *graphe* = inscription; writing; visual representation or image; drawing [from whence the English “graphic” originates]

The ancient Greeks would do what every child did - draw in the dirt trying to express visually a thought or idea. The term they used has become part of our language - *GRAPHICS*. Truly Graphic Design is nothing more than a re-development of the same concept with one goal; financial success.

This course will explain the very basics of Graphic Design and what it entails. Basic skills and concepts will be provided. It is not exhaustive, to say the least - but it will provide a taste for senior high students to entice them to consider further study.

## Daily Time and Effort Expectations:

This overview course is one quarter in length. Students are expected to engage in daily drawing graphic exercises as well as weekly sketching. There will be one test over Graphic Concepts; the remainder of the class will be devoted to exercises and hands-on learning. The class will have some computer graphic exposure.

## Sketchbook Checks:

Weekly assignments with specific focus exercises will be provided and checked.

## Google Classroom:

Since this class works with hands-on projects, Google Classroom is more of a depository for handouts, information and assignment scheduling. Assignments will not be handed in on the Google Classroom platform.

## Course Evaluation:

The percentage breakdown for semester grade calculation will be as follows:

**Skills Practice**.....**35%**

Ongoing, daily assignments, exercises and practice will be provided for skills practice to teach fundamentals of Graphic Design.

**Assessments**.....**50%**

One overview test is provided at the beginning of the quarter, then repeated (the best of both exams will be awarded); weekly observations will also be administered to determine skill proficiency.

**Final Exam or Project**.....**15%**

For this class, a final illustration project is the final exam - the project should show the student's ability to present all Elements and Principles of Design.
