Career guidance is helping individuals make educational and employment choices based on understanding how to achieve their end goal.

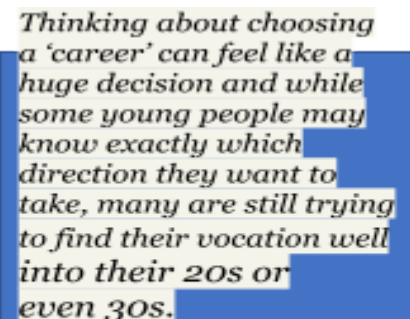
Whether you have it all mapped out or not, career advice and guidance can help explain the options and spark other ideas. It is a confidential and nonjudgmental conversation.

Why is career guidance Important?

Chatting with a Career Adviser lets you evaluate your strengths and career aspirations. You can identify suitable career paths and understand which qualifications or standards must be met to progress and prepare you for the next stage of education, employment, or training.

Benefits of a Careers Interview

- greater self-awareness
- identification of more achievable ambitions
- improved decision-making skills
- increased awareness of opportunities
