- Develop skills, attitudes, and knowledge fundamental to continuous learning.

Course Description

Developed based on the Ontario Arts Curriculum, 2010

This course is intended for students to develop an understanding and appreciation of music through both practical skills and creative work. Students will not only find in music a source of enjoyment and personal satisfaction, but also gain creative problem-solving skills, individual and cooperative work habits, knowledge of themselves and others, a sense of personal responsibility, and connections to their communities and future careers.

The expectations for courses in the Arts are organized into three distinct, but related strands:

FOUNDATIONS

- Learning and understanding the symbols, concepts and conventions used in music theory.
- Demonstrating an understanding of responsible practices and performance conventions relating to music.

CREATING AND PERFORMING

- The practical application of performance skills and knowledge of theory as they relate to the performance medium, as well as composition.

REFLECTING, RESPONDING AND ANALYZING

- Listening and responding actively to live and recorded performances to understand the language of music, its historical and cultural context, and how effectively its composers and performers communicate with their audience.
- Demonstrating an understanding of the history of some musical forms and of characteristics of types of music from around the world.

Spring Concert (5%) - The spring concert is an opportunity for students to perform the music they have been working on in class for a live audience. It is a course requirement for students to attend and perform at the concert.	Knowledge, Application

- Rehearsal and Concert expectations: All Music classes will participate in one concert during the course. This is the culmination of months of practice and is an important part of students' musical experience. It also serves as a real-life example of how they contribute to bringing the community together through music.
