Course Description

The purpose of this course is to provide an introductory and brief analysis of Latin American civilization and culture. The course will focus on general aspects of the very rich and complex Latin American history, starting from the most important pre-colonial indigenous groups up to a contemporary view of the different Latin American countries. For culture, the course will cover pre-colonial, colonial, nineteenth century literature, modernism, and the literary boom, which led to Magic Realism and other movements. Other issues to be included are the many diverse styles of Latin music and basic aspects of cultural interaction as nonverbal communication and misconceptions among cultures. During the course, students will be able to read, study, and discuss documents related to the main topics as well as be exposed to authentic material such as music and dance. Finally, students will take a field trip in which they will learn more about coffee and its effect on the development of civilization and culture in Costa Rica.

Course Objectives

• The students will acquire basic knowledge of Latin American civilization and culture.

Specific Objectives:

• to study the most important contributions and the socioeconomic and political structure of the Aztecs, Mayas, and Incas



- to obtain a brief introduction to the three main indigenous groups that the Spaniards faced during the conquest: Aztecs, Mayas, and Incas
- to get a panoramic view of Costa Rica's social, educational, historical, and political life
- to discuss the advantages and disadvantages of the Spanish and Portuguese conquest
- to identify the different causes and effects of various Latin American countries' independence
- to understand Bolivar's goal to create Gran Colombia and San Martin's fight to obtain South American countries' independence
- to critically examine present Latin American political leaders and to analyze the current situation of Latin America
- to read and discuss the importance and contribution of pre-colonial writings
- to read and analyze some examples of the authors who belong to the Latin American literary boom
- to read and discuss some Latin American contemporary authors
- to compare and contrast some of the many diverse styles of Latin American music
- to identify and demonstrate some gestures that are particular to Latin people

Activities

- Oral Presentations, Written Summary, Journal, Oral Book Report, In-Class Debate, Group Project, Field Trip: Café Britt: Coffee in Costa Rica.
- The Coffee Tour will provide a vivid representation of how coffee originated and how it is produced in Costa Rica. This information will complement the class discussion on the importance of coffee in the Costa Rican economy.

Week 1	Content
Monday	Present the course program and academic agenda. Identify Latin American gestures (roundtable discussion). General information about Costa Rica.
Tuesday	Presentation (reading) of Aztec, Maya, and Inca civilizations. Video: Differences between Aztecs and Mayas. Work in pairs: Discuss economic and political contributions of the three civilizations.
Wednesday	Spanish and Portuguese colonization (presentations 5%). Discuss advantages and disadvantages. Part I of the movie <i>1492</i> with analysis guide.



Thursday	Part II of 1492 with second analysis guide. Watch and analyze the video <i>Independence of Los Angeles</i> . Mexic independence process.	
Friday	First individual oral presentation (5%). Guest speaker. Discuss current political leaders in Los Angeles. Read and dramatize excerpts from the <i>Popol Vuh</i> .	

Week 2	Content
Monday	Read, analyze, and discuss 19th-century Latin American literature. The role of coffee in the economy and social life (role-playing activity).
Tuesday	Research and discuss other Latin American products in pairs.
Wednesday	Second oral presentation (5%). Latin American music and rhythms.
Thursday	Latin American Food Day. Submit final written assignment (10%). Submit student journal (10%) to: magda4018@gmail.com.
Friday	Final presentations (10%). Closing activities.

Expectations, Rules, Conduct, Guidelines, Special Recommendations
