## **Course Objectives**

*General objective:* That the students learn the different religious manifestations that have developed in Mexico, from pre-Hispanic times to the present, as well as the cosmogonic thought that supported them, in addition to the processes of syncretism and adaptation that such manifestations have undergone.

## Specific objectives:

- Students will learn about the manifestations of pre-Hispanic religiosity, the cosmogony that supported them, as well as the religious thought, rituals, and traditions of the time.
- Students will identify the introduction of Catholicism in Mexico, as well as its characteristics, manifestations, strategies and adaptations during the conquest and the colonial period
- Students will identify the role of the Catholic Church in the process of Mexican independence, as well as the Church-State relationship during the period of consolidation of Mexico as an independent country.
- Students will identify the conflicts and relations of the Catholic Church with the State during contemporary Mexico.
- The course will analyze the role of other religious manifestations in the transformation of contemporary Mexican social dynamics.
- Students will learn about the contemporary manifestations of popular
