
Honors Sophomore Literature & Composition - Summer Reading 2022



This summer, in addition to your free choice book, all students taking Honors Sophomore Literature in the fall are required to read Ruta Sepetys's *The Fountains of Silence*, a work of historical fiction set in 1950's Spain during the dictatorship of Francisco Franco. The novel centers on the relationship between a Spanish teen, Ana, whose family has been victimized by the regime, and Daniel, an American oil tycoon's son and budding photographer.

Copies of the novel can be found at Jabberwocky and the Newburyport Public Library. If possible, have access to your book for the first few weeks of school, as we will be working with it in class.

Assignment Overview and Links:

- 1. Review and **make** a **copy of** the <u>Reading Log</u> and <u>Reading Questions</u> assignments. This will give you an indication of what to look for and record as you read.
- 2. As you read each third of the book, complete a Reading Log entry, and at least one quote and reflection for each of the Reading Questions.

Due Dates and Expectations:

- Summer work will be due during the first week of school in the fall.
- We will be using your summer work as the foundation for our discussion and work for *The Fountains of Silence* in the fall; you should be prepared by reading the book and completing all assignments to the best of your ability
- Your work will be graded according to the rubrics provided. You will be assessed for quality of thought and thoroughness.
- Your work will also be run through a plagiarism checker. Plagiarized work will receive a 0.

Tips for Success:

- ★ Give yourself at least 2-3 weeks to read and complete the assignment. This will allow you the time to enjoy the book and to read reflectively.
- ★ Tuck some post-its inside your book and use them to mark important passages as you read. Then, you have something to go back to at the end of each third to help you complete the assignments.
