Conceptualization

- 1. How do you define race? How do you define ethnicity? How are your definitions for race and ethnicity similar or different?
- 2. Why is race and/or ethnicity important to your research question?
- 3. Where do race and/or ethnicity fit into your conceptual model?
- 4. In your manuscript, have you communicated your answers to questions #1, 2, and 3 clearly?

Measurement

- 5. What dimension(s) of race or ethnicity is(are) most relevant to your research question?
- 6. If you are collecting your own data, what kind of question(s) will you use to measure your chosen dimension(s) of race and ethnicity?
- 7. If your work uses existing data, how does that data source conceptualize and measure race and ethnicity?
 - a. Is it consistent with your research question?
 - b. If it is not, what are the limitations or resultant biases?
- 8. Measurement specific questions to consider, specifically around self-report questions, include:
 - a. Is the self-report question open or close-ended?
 - b. If close-ended, what is the list of potential response options? These racial and ethnic groups are
 the product of social forces, conscious individual decisions, and <u>federal reporting requirements</u>
 (themselves based on social forces and individual decisions).
 - c. Are participants asked what group they MOSTLY consider themselves? Or should they be asked to report on ALL of the groups they consider themselves to be?
- 9. In your manuscript, have you unambiguously communicated what measure(s) you used?

Coding

- 10. How will you code race or ethnicity in statistical analyses?
- 11. Have you collapsed race and ethnicity into an ethno-racial construct?
- 12. If you aggregate different racial or ethnic groups, what are the potential implications for your findings?
- 13. In your manuscript, have you communicated which groups you collapsed together and why? Have you addressed possible biases or limitations of such a choice in the Discussion section?

Analysis & Interpretation

- 14. Does your interpretation align with the dimension of race that was measured?
- 15. Have you checked that you are not assigning a biological cause to racial or ethnic differences that were measured using a self-reported dimension?
- 16. Have you considered interpersonal, organizational, and structural racism as a potential explanation or mechanism?
