This section contains a summary of articles or research summaries covering research problems, objectives, methods, results, and contribution of research results. The abstract is presented at the beginning of the text and consists of 200 to 250 words (preferably presented in English). Abstracts are given keywords (key words) to facilitate the preparation of the article index.

A. INTRODUCTION

The introduction contains an overview that includes justification, hypotheses (if any), and research objectives. References are proportional, presented concisely and succinctly, and directly relevant to the issue. The introduction is not the same as a literature review. Paragraphs are indented 5 spaces. References are written in APA 6th edition style, written in brackets [1].

Writing technique: 1) From the introduction to the reference list, write on one page. 2) The title of the Introduction (up to the title of the Reference List) should be written in Title Case and centered in the left column using Times New Roman font size 12 bold, below the abstract and keywords, with a spacing of 3 spaces. 3) The manuscript is written in several paragraphs without subsections, with 1 line spacing and Times New Roman font size 12, directly below the Introduction title with 1.5 line spacing (also applies to the reference list). 4) If the left column is full, continue/move to the right column. 5) The introduction ends with a brief summary (1-2 sentences) of the main points discussed and the purpose of the research.

B. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

Includes the approach used, data collection, definition and measurement of variables, and data analysis methods and techniques used.

C. RESEARCH RESULT

Contains a presentation of data results on the final results of the data analysis process. The final form of this section consists of numbers, images, and tables.

D. DISCUSSION

Includes the researcher's abstract after reviewing the research results and existing theories that form the basis of the research. Add theories and research from other people, and include your synthesis of these.

E. CONCLUSION

This is a summary of the results and discussion, accompanied by suggestions made by

the author for further development. The conclusion is the essence of the main results of the research (accepting or rejecting the hypothesis) and is based on the facts found in the research, so it must be firm, concise, and clear so as not to cause multiple interpretations. Recommendations are based on the results of the research to help or overcome research problems, so they refer to practical actions, policies, new theory development, and the need for further research.

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To make it easier for you to create a bibliography, we recommend using reference tools such as Mendeley, Zotero, or End Note with the American Psychological Association 6th Edition (APA) style format. The bibliography should be arranged alphabetically with a minimum of 15 references.
