# Suggested Shops

**Urban Archery** (In-Store)

Urban Archery does not include all their products online. You can order online, but It is best to head instore to view their entire range.

Oz Hunting & Bows (In-Store)

Focuses more on Compound archery than Recurve Archery.

eBay - ArchQuick (Online/Pickup)

The Seller has their items in a storage facility located in Maribyrnong. If he has them in stock, you can message the seller and request a local pick up.

#### **Archery Supplies** (Online)

This shop is located in South Australia. For reference I bought express shipping, and purchase to arrival time was 7 days (1 week), big range, usually well stocked.

#### **Arm Guard**

- Arm Guards are more of a preference thing, and there's not really much to 'look out for'
- Only suggestion is if you're purchasing a full leather one, remember you will be shooting in summer/hotter days
- Kayla's suggested arm guard: Bohning Slip On Armguard

#### Finger Tab

- Finger tabs are just a piece of leather between your fingers and the string, however some finger tabs have extras.
- My personal opinion, the best extras to have are;
  - A space between the index and middle finger for your nock/arrow to have space
  - Elastic or tie on the back to hold the finger tab in place
- Kayla's suggested Finger Tab: <u>Archquick Archery Finger Tab for Recurve Bow</u>

#### Quiver

- Ensure it would be convenient to get your arrows. Most common is the hip quiver, though you can get back mounted ones.
- You can also get quivers with pockets for your other accessories (Finger Tab, Sling, etc.)
- Kayla's suggested Quiver: Archery Arrow Quiver 4 Tube Holder Bag

#### Bow Stand

- With a bow stand, there are two different types;
  - o A 'turn' method, in which the legs fold out
  - A click in method, which you have to manually push in the legs to create the stand
- If you're using a wooden riser, your riser may be too thick for some stands. Be sure to take this into account.
- suggested is a bit more expensive, however you can easily find cheaper ones
- Kayla's suggested Bow Stand: Winner S-AL Bowstand

#### Riser

- The Riser is the one of the only things you never have to replace. If you can invest money in your bow, invest the most in this part.
- With Wooden risers, they are thicker than aluminium. This makes the "Sight space" a bit smaller.

#### Limbs

- Limbs will change as you go further in distance for shooting. The Limbs being changed changes the poundage, however Urban Archery will be able to assist for your first bow
- For Poundage testing, hold your bow as if you're about to shoot (Without the arrow) and hold for 30 seconds. If your arms hurt too much, a lower poundage may be suggested.

#### **Arrow Rest**

- For an arrow rest in the beginning, the small plastic ones are okay, but not good over time
- The best type of arrow rest you can get is the magnetic metal bar ones.
- Also suggested to get a 'bent' metal bar. If it is straight, arrows may slide off and cause you a lot more hassle.
- Kayla's suggested Arrow Rest: <u>New Arrow Rest CNC Magnetic Ambidextrous</u> Recurve Bow

#### Plunger

- For the plunger, make sure you get the allen key that fits it! (I fell for that mistake!)
- Kayla's suggested Plunger: <u>Cartel Plunger Button Supra</u>

#### Finger Sling

- Ensure the finger sling has a 'tightening' feature. Where your fingers go through the loops, make sure there's something to tighten so the sling doesn't fall off.
- Kayla's suggested Sling: <u>CR Archery Finger Sling Compound Recurve Bow</u>

#### Arrows

- Preferred amount of arrows is 12. You shoot 6 at the range, and have 6 as backup (Trust me, you'll need them!)
- The number on the shaft shows the stiffness, but Urban Archery once again will help you initially with what stiffness you should use.
- Kayla's suggested Arrows: <u>Black Eagle Intrepid Arrow</u>

#### Spare Nocks

- Never such a thing as too many nocks. You will break them... repeatedly. Get yourself some spare.
- There are different types of nocks (beiter, Glue on, Insert, Lighted and Pin.) You can
  ask Urban once you have your arrows which ones your arrow uses, but for the Black
  Eagle suggested, they are insert.
- Kayla's suggested Nocks: <u>Black Eagle Standard Nock (Dozen)</u>

# **Square**

- Make sure the markings on the ruler are painted/drawn on. Engraved-only makes it very hard to see when trying to quickly measure your brace height.
- Kayla's suggested Square: <u>Topoint T bow Square</u>

# <u>Sight</u>

- For sights, you must ensure the sight itself has something to grip onto, please see images below;
- Smooth:

• Spin:



# Clicker

- Despite the name, not all clickers make a noise. You will have to review the item to make sure it makes the click if you wish it to make a noise
- If your riser does not have a clicker mount, you can get "sight Mounted Clickers" where it mounts on the sight itself, or "Under Sight Plate Mount" Which mounts underneath your sight.
- Example of Sight Mounted: Arrow Archery Clicker Magnetic Mounted on Bow Sight
- Example of Under Sight Mount: Cavalier Magnetic Clicker
