

ResourceContracts allows for the implementation of country specific sites that are either managed by the relevant government agency or the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative National Secretariat. The country team is trained to be proficient in the uploading of contracts and the recording of metadata and the sites frontend can be customised in accordance with the specific requirements. To date three country sites have been implemented as outlined below.

Guinea

Guinean President, Alpha Condé, committed in his 2010 electoral manifesto to reform the mining sector and improve resource transparency. This was put into practice by the passing of a new Mining Code in 2011, the review of all existing contracts and the implementation of an online database to publish and disclose resource contracts.

Guinea was the first country to implement a ResourceContracts country site in 2013. The site was developed on the first generation ResourceContracts platform and includes contracts and supporting documents.




Philippines

Prior to implementing the ResourceContracts country site, PH-EITI released extractive contracts in static PDF format. This meant that the contracts were not machine-readable and largely unsearchable. Consequently, finding key terms in contracts was challenging for users, who often had to sift through numerous clauses to find a definition or the conditions of a specific obligation.

With the introduction of ResourceContracts contracts are now published in machine-readable and open data format allowing interested parties to search, copy and download contracts. A total of forty-four mineral and hydrocarbon contracts and over four hundred supporting documents have been uploaded by PH-EITI. All of the contracts have associated metadata captured with more than half annotated.

The ResourceContracts site was relaunched at the Open Government Partnership Conference in October 2015 with the PH-EITI becoming the first beneficiary of the new ResourceContracts platform.



Sierra Leone

Both the Ministry of Mines and Mineral Resources and the National Minerals Agency have been uploading contracts online to promote transparency in the minerals sector in the country. Before implementing the ResourceContracts country site the National Minerals Agency released contracts in static PDF format making it difficult to interrogate due to the complex legal nature of the documents.

The platform, launched during February 2016, will maximise public access of mining contracts in Sierra Leone and allow users to search contracts by natural resource or by type of contract, view summaries of key provisions and download full contracts.



In the future all related documents such as Environmental and Social Impact Assessment studies and Community Development Agreements will be linked to the respective agreements where relevant.
