Andrew's Health Equity and Climate Research

Joan thanked everyone for their participation. Andrew then presented his research on health services and care delivery methods, focusing on cancer health equity and the impact of research participation in climate change.

Climate Change and Healthcare Ethics

Andrew presents an overview of a study on the clinical medical ethics of climate change and healthcare delivery. The study includes focus groups and surveys of physicians and patients to understand their perspectives on the ethical issues surrounding climate change and healthcare. Key findings include a general agreement on the need to consider environmental impacts in healthcare, but with differing views between patients and physicians on how to approach these issues. The physician survey reveals varied opinions on limiting treatment options based on environmental impact, with responses influenced by whether physicians perceive climate change affecting their patients' health.

Physicians' Climate Change Attitudes and Healthcare

Andrew presents findings from a survey on physicians' attitudes towards climate change and its impact on healthcare. The majority of respondents believe climate change is happening and will affect patient health, with 62% expecting moderate to significant effects in the next decade. Physicians who perceive a high climate impact on their patients tend to be younger, from minoritized groups, and in primary care. The survey also explores physicians' views on their responsibilities regarding sustainability in healthcare, with most feeling comfortable participating in hospital programs or changing clinical practices. Interestingly, about 35% of respondents agree that environmental impact should be considered even if it means limiting some treatment options, with those perceiving high climate impact being more likely to accept this stance.

Climate and Health Ethics Guidance

Andrew presents a summary of efforts to develop climate and health ethics guidance for clinicians. The team has created a document that adapts existing clinical ethics frameworks to include climate considerations, focusing on patient-clinician interactions. Key aspects include counseling patients using the "3 A's" approach (applicable, appropriate, actionable), role modeling climate-informed behaviors, and addressing health equity concerns. The guidance also covers managing conflicts with patients who are skeptical about climate change and introduces the concept of "climate-informed consent" in healthcare decision-making.

Climate Change Impact on Medical Research

Andrew discussed the impact of climate change on medical research, highlighting the need for transparency about the carbon intensity of clinical trials and the potential for decentralized clinical trials to reduce environmental impact. He also addressed questions about the generalizability of their findings and the global applicability of their guidelines, acknowledging the influence of high-income countries on the development of these guidelines. Andrew also mentioned the integration of climate and health education into medical curricula and the importance of addressing transportation-related issues in healthcare.

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
