## User Pages

User pages are an important link in the FamilySearch wiki communication loop. Some FamilySearch Wiki user pages provide e-mail, forums or Skype contact information, along with details about the individual's education, experience, research interests and/or roll in the FS wiki. However, some contributors are not setting up user pages, or are using them in ways that are inconsistent with the purposes of the FS wiki.

I think we've reached a point of "critical mass" where it is time to formulate a policy that helps users understand (1) the purpose of FS wiki user pages, (2) what they should be able to find on *any* contributor's user page (including their own), (3) the value of using talk pages to facilitate dialogue with an ever-widening circle of contributors, and (4) description of content that is appropriate (and examples of what would not be appropriate) on a user page.

If we decide that it's time for a policy, then I suggest that we use the Contributor's Meeting to begin the process to craft one.

## User Pages

I can understand the reluctance of some people in sharing information about themselves. However, I believe it is very important that we, as a community, have the trust to share at least a brief statement of our interest, knowledge and background in genealogy. We do not need to share a long biography, but it is certainly helpful to know who is adding information to a page, why they have an interest in a subject or locality, and a little about their experience.

The purpose of a user page on a wiki is NOT to become a personal diary or journal, nor a blog. That has no place in a wiki. A wiki should be a place where a user could go to gain knowledge, not read a lengthy biography or list of personal steps taken to add information to the Wiki, unless instructing another individual about how to add a type of chart or template or image to the wiki.

## Great discussion about the user page

I like the ideas expressed so far about the user page. The [guidelines for the user page](#), along with the help page provide an excellent foundation for understanding what the user page is and why it's important. But most wiki users are completely unaware of the pages' existence. How can we fix this?

I would like to propose that the discussion include a brainstorm of ideas for informing users of the existence of the [user page](#); encouraging the use of the user page and it's corresponding [talk page](#).

When we recognize that something is missing from the [help page](#), we should go ahead and add it, or at least add it to that pages' [discussion page](#). Someone mentioned they didn't know about the little message line that appears on the wiki when we have new content on our personal talk pages. Is this feature explained on the [guideline page](#) or the [help page](#)? If not, it should be added. (I haven't checked it yet myself to see if it's there)

I have a couple basic questions about the [guideline page](#) the [help page](#) and the [guideline page about the talk page](#). Should these two pages about the user page be combined? If not, why not? Does the guideline page about the talk page have a corresponding "help page"? If not, why not? Should there be one?

I think that having multiple pages related to the same topic like user pages and discussion pages is hard for everyone. It's hard to find all the related pages and you never know if you have actually found all the pages that relate to the topic you are looking for. I think this is a basic navigational issue that should be included in the discussion.

I think that kind of inconsistency creates confusion.

I agree that creating User pages are a good idea for anyone who wants to come in and work in the wiki on at least a semi-regular basis. But I think that most people who come in have no idea about what they are and why they should create one.

### **Where to put the message:**

There are to begin with two major places we could make it a point to get this across, and actually those things are already there:

1. In the Welcome message
2. In the Getting Started section of the Edit and Contribute page

Anywhere else this info should be where it would make a big difference?

### **Too many Help pages:**

Regarding the different help pages on these topics, the two separate "User page" links (in the Help and FamilySearch Wiki namespaces) are for different purposes. This is something that I've struggled with, but my understanding is this:

1. The Help namespace is for help in HOW TO do something in the wiki (How do I create and use a User page and what should I put in it).
2. The FamilySearch Wiki namespace is ABOUT something in the wiki (Why is a User page important to me to be aware of).

So there are uses for both articles. I honestly wish we didn't use both for some of these topics because it's a very fine line and it is confusing. The "Talk page guidelines" on the other hand is different yet again because it's specifically about the Discussion pages (which I completely agree with you, it bugs me to call them both Talk and Discussion pages.)

Perhaps we could create a major article of "Communicating with other contributors in the

Wiki" that would give an overview and link out to all of these articles, essentially tying them together. That could be put into a LOT of different pages; as I've created a few pages I've wished there was something like that.....

BTW - that table is there on each of those "FamilySearch Wiki" articles about each namespace. It identifies the # of each namespace which can be used in some situations but is not common.
