Amazon does not allow associates of the Author to publish reviews due to past bad acts by a few "mean," defamatory players. This prevents our closest fans and readers from posting reviews.

In June, two published books by local authors in our group had the books on sale for 99 cents for two days. I hope most of you purchased them on sale and are reading or scanning them in order to write 4 or 5 star book reviews on Amazon.

Contact me to request your book be placed on the review list. Most books will be on Kindle Unlimited or cost \$.99 if you don't have KU. We will be doing these book reviews every month. Please contribute to make this a marketing success for our community.

IF you feel the book does not deserve a rating of 4 or 5 stars, please don't review the book on Amazon. Reviews posted with 3 stars or less are considered negative by the algorithms. You may message me with a poor review and I will pass it on to the author so they can revise if possible. I have contacts with over 500 Florida writers. If only 20% of you write a short review and post on Amazon, that is 100 reviews. Most of us struggle to get our readers to write reviews; let's BE the Reviewers. We can do this together.

Any time you are researching contests, check the prizes. Publishing packages are not a good prize, they are a marketing ploy. How many average entries do they receive? Look for reviews and read a few—good and bad.

The Florida Book Awards

The Florida Book Awards, established in 2006, is an annual awards program that recognizes, honors, and celebrates the literature by Florida authors and books about Florida published in the previous year.

Authors must be Florida residents, except in the Florida nonfiction, cooking, and visual arts categories, where the subject matter must focus on Florida.

The awards program is coordinated by the Florida State University Libraries, with the involvement of other library, literary, and cultural organizations, including the State Library and Archives of Florida, Florida Library Association, Florida Humanities, Florida Center for the Book, Midtown Reader, and the Word of South festival.

The call for submissions of eligible books is announced in the summer and concludes in early January. By early March, medalists will be announced in each of the 11 categories. Traditionally, awards are presented to all award winners at a banquet in Tallahassee in April.

Florida Book Award winners are promoted in a variety of ways, including participation in conference and book festival panels. Winning books and their authors are featured in the Summer issue of FORUM, the statewide magazine of the Florida Humanities. Visit the FORUM website to learn more about the authors and to buy the award-winning books. Historical interviews with The Florida Book Award winners that were featured on "The Florida Channel" are linked and archived on this website. Florida Book Award-winning books are on permanent display in the library at the Governor's Mansion in Tallahassee, and in an exhibit case on the third floor of Florida State University's Strozier Library.

There are two more Awards groups I wish to share with you. Many of the writing contests online and in magazines are shams, a way for the host to make a lot of money with little output. I try to ensure the contests I share are not shams. The best way to tell the difference is: Has anyone ever heard of it? Is it respected in your genre? What organizations are they affiliated with?

Two large contests that are a bit pricey and have overwhelming competition are Writer's Digest Contests and the IPPY's. I personally know a few winners from Writer's Digest and the awards are great promotional tools, because they are Respected as rofessionals and Internationally known.

## Writing Tips

#### The Weird Writing Rule Nobody Teaches You

You just know it when you see it

Our brains are magnificently quirky.

Describe what you see in the above image.

There is no trick to this. Most of you will have said something like 'a small yellow car.'

Yet if English is your first language and someone were to describe it to you as *a yellow small car*, your ears would tell you that, despite being correct, it sounds wrong. You instinctively know we say it the other way around.

#### Size comes before color.

This isn't a grammar rule I learned in English class. My teacher never told me what order adjectives need to be in. It is something that has naturally worked its way into my subconscious knowledge.

If I add another adjective to this set, I sense more rules. It's a *small yellow metal car*. There's no problem with that. The order dictates that the material it is made from has to come last.

It would be unusual if I described it as a *metal yellow small car* because that sounds peculiar. If I add my opinion, I could say it looks like a 'cute' car and I would have no problem knowing where to put it:

It's a cute small yellow metal car.

However, should I put those in any other order it would sound like unconventional gibberish. *Feel free to try it*.

Isn't that weird? We have the same words describing the same car and changing the order makes it intrinsically unnatural.

You may already know the rules regarding adjectives. Here is the order I obey:

## Opinion, size, age, shape, color, origin, material, purpose, noun.

I could describe my car as:

It's a cute small old rounded yellow Volkswagen metal toy car.

Why does this matter? This probably won't make sense if you are a non-native English speaker.

The French would say, *C'est une jolie petite vieille voiture jouet en métal Volkswagen jaune arrondie — This is a pretty small old car toy in metal Volkswagen yellow rounded.* Language matters.

There are other schools of thought on this order.

## Quantity, quality, size, shape, age, color, nationality, material, noun.

Which would make my car:

One nice small rounded old yellow German metal car.

I'm not convinced. Swapping age and shape doesn't feel right to me and there is no place for 'toy'.

Another I found on the **font of all knowledge** suggested this order:

- 1. **Determiner** a, an, the, both, either, some, many, my, your, our etc.
- 2. **Opinion** good, bad, great, terrible, pretty, silly, lovely, beautiful, etc.
- 3. **Size** huge, big, large, tiny, enormous, little, tall, long, gigantic etc.
  - 4. **Shape** flat, round, square, triangular, rectangular, etc.

- 5. Age—young, old, new, ancient, antique, six-year-old, youthful,
- 6. **Color** red, black, bright, faded, shining, yellow, orange, etc.
- 7. Origin— French, American, Canadian, Mexican, Greek, Swiss,
- 8. Material—plastic, metal, silver, gold, wooden, paper, etc.
- 9. **Purpose** writing, rolling, sleeping, roasting, running, etc.



So the description of the above image would read:

Two lovely average-sized bent ripe yellow-skinned shop-bought organic eating bananas.

This misses out on their physical quality —**half-peeled.** So where does *Half-Peeled* sit on that list? The more adjectives you have, the greater the debate.

According to the Cambridge Dictionary, half-peeled is a physical quality, which should come between size and shape. Would it also fit between opinion and size or between material and purpose, but nowhere else?

The acid test is surely to pick one and decide if it goes before or after, which is easier to determine.

#### Why do we have to put adjectives in a specific order?

I can't say for sure, but there are a few theories. The closer an adjective is to its noun, the more important it is for describing the noun.

Calling it a yellow car is more specific than saying it is rusty, but that raises the question of importance — if it's rustier than it is yellow, which should go first?

Knowing the importance of whether it is a *new* car or a *toy* car would depend on the circumstances — do you need it as a getaway car or as the token race car for playing a game of Monopoly?

## Who's afraid of the big bad wolf? Ooh!

Why doesn't this conform to the adjective rule? According to all those lists you read above, this should be *Who's afraid of the bad big wolf*? Yet, it isn't right; it isn't what we are used to.

If you thought things were complicated enough, here comes the I-A-O rule or 'ablaut reduplication.'

For two or three words, the vowels should follow the order of I, A, O.

For example, splish splash splosh.

The I-A-O rule is another of those illogical quirks of the English language. It's not a recognized rule, it's something we subconsciously apply.

You tell me what is wrong with these examples: toe tac tic, song-sing, Kong King, clop-clip, chat-chit, patter-pitter.

Ablaut reduplication involves repeating a word for emphasis or pairing it with a similar-sounding or similarly-spelt word. It links words that have internal vowel alternations.

There you go, bish bash bosh. It's always worth considering when writing congeries.

Do you need to use commas between adjectives?

I had them in my first draft, then took them out.

When you have multiple adjectives in a sentence, some need commas and some don't. There's a method to this one. If two or more adjectives are in the same category, stick a comma between them.

• I love sweet, tasty bananas.

Adjectives from different categories don't have commas between them.

My small yellow toy car has gone missing.

Caveat: you never put a comma between the last adjective and the noun it describes or between a determiner and an adjective at the beginning of a phrase.

- My yellow car.
- Two delicious bananas.

The order of adjectives is one of those quirks of the English language that is worth following if you aren't sure.

If it doesn't feel right, change it and if it still doesn't work we can say, Two lovely bananas, ripe and yellow, ready-peeled for eating.

Writing a Review for Amazon &/or Good Reads for our local writers

I am hoping to work with all of you, published or planning to be published reviewing our fellow Plotting Success author's books and in return being reviewed by our fellow authors. Amazon rankings (which affect sales) are weighed heavily on reviews, yet we all find it difficult to get people to leave reviews.

I have asked that you all review two books per month by our fellow Plotting Success writers. The 2 books we review will be dropped in a price promotion to 99 cents for 2 days. For any struggling writers who can't afford it, contact me and I will ask the authors to "gift" you a copy to review. This 2-day promotion helps kick off sales rankings to Amazon readers, but our purpose is to read the book and leave a short review to increase the promoted authors' Review rankings which are more important than daily sales.

IF YOU DON'T HAVE AN E-BOOK, contact me. You are missing a HUGE opportunity for sales and reviews.

Now, on to the **Tips on Writing Amazon Reviews**.

Write in first person. This is YOUR review. You want to focus on why they should read the book. What did you like about it? If it isn't your genre, did you still find it interesting? For those who have been to a writer's critique group, we critique work outside our preferred genre all the time. It

opens us up to new adventures. As writers we can look and see if the elements are working—the characters are authentic, people we can visualize and like or hate, we know if the story arc is working or if we are all hoping something...anything...happens. We all know (At least I hope we do) that there needs to be a resolution to the goal set at the beginning of the novel. In a nonfiction book, there needs to be a summary conclusion.

When rating the books our group is focusing on, please do not rate a book lower than 4 stars. If it is poorly written or not deserving of a four or five star rating, please mail the review to me and I will forward it to the author so they can attempt to improve their work. The purpose of these reviews is to help our fellow authors (and ourselves when our turn for review arises), not ruin them.

A Review is NOT a book report. Don't summarize the story.

You will need a "Title" for your Review. Don't use the title of the book for your Review Title. Using an emotion the book gave you works well for the Review \

Title: "Unputdownable" "Disturbing" "Totally Relatable" "Wild Imagination" "Magical"

Be clear and specific about what you liked.

If it is nonfiction, did it provide relevant information? Was it interesting? Who would it appeal to the most? Is it clear? Did you learn anything? Were facts provided with evidence sources? Was it well researched?

If it is fiction or a memoir: Were the characters people you would enjoy hanging out with? Are the characters fully dimensional? Is the dialogue realistic? Is the "Inciting Incident" in the first chapter? Is the protagonist or the primary antagonist in the first chapter? Is there a Resolution at the end that dealt with the protagonists goal or quest? Is the pace maintained throughout the book? Did it feel formulaic? Would you read more by the author?

Each month when doing the obligatory review—remember it is important to help other writers if you want the favor returned—keep it short.

I am putting a couple examples below of Four and Five star reviews on Amazon that work well. ROMANCE: "From the beginning chapter, I was drawn into this book and it continued to do so throughout the book. It is well written. The characters are well developed. Anyone who enjoys a good love story and suspense will appreciate this book. I can't wait to read another book by this author."

THRILLER: "This is definitely one of the best Alex Cross books, if not the best. You begin guessing as to what could possibly cause a person to kill entire families in such a horrible disgusting way. The twists and turns in this novel create more guesses that you instinctively know are incorrect. The second story line involving Bree creates a diversion from Alex, Samuel, and the FBI and even more guessing. The finale leaves one wanting more. Superb story lines."

MAIN STREAM—LITERARY: "This novel is beautiful. The writing is done at a very high level. As others have pointed out, the book switches perspectives often, going from Oskar's POV to letters to his grandparents'. I've read that some found this confusing, but I was never confused at all. I found it very easy to follow."

You can rate the book four or five stars and still discuss things you might not like about the book in the review section. Be honest, but not brutal—unless it is well deserved. Hopefully we can keep the brutality in-house.

If any of the books I ask you to review over the coming months are abominations, please let me know. There are many I have not read. I don't have the time to read all the books published by local writers.
