# What is the Difference between a Post and a Comment on a BMCC OpenLab WordPress Site?

On an OpenLab site, members of the site's profile can contribute to the site, mainly by:

- Creating a post, like writing a blog/article. See <a href="https://example.com/how-to-write-a-post-or-page">how-to-write-a-post-or-page</a>.
- Commenting on an existing post, like leaving a reply to a post or to someone else's comment. See <a href="https://how-to-write-a-comment">how-to-write-a-comment</a>.

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## Key differences between posts and comments:

### Posts (like a blog entry/article)...

- Can have **media**, like images, pdfs, and videos.
- Must be written by a logged-in member of the profile/author on the site.
- Can have categories and tags, which allows the site admin to organize where posts show on the site.
- Have privacy settings: They can be public, private, or password-protected.
- Have **formatting** options, like boldface or italics.
- Are composed in the dashboard of a WordPress site.
- Can be edited or deleted by their logged-in author at any time.
- Have a unique URL because they make up a page on the website.

### Comments (aka "replies")...

- Can't have media by default, but can include links to media on the web.\*
- Do not need to be written by a site author. However, some OpenLab sites are set to require commenters to be logged in to the OpenLab.
- Have no categories or tags.
- Have no privacy settings (but, can be made on password-protected posts).
- Have no formatting options.
- Are written directly on the site itself.
- Cannot be edited or deleted by the comment writer; only by the admin.
- Have no designated URL.

\*To allow commenters to attach and embed media on your BMCC OpenLab sites, use the DCO Comment Attachment plugin!
