Little ones crying because they need a diaper change, or to be feed or just because they are fussy, a third grader that is struggling with reading, a second grader that doesn't understand the new math concept, a special needs student that appreciates someone spending time with them, a lunchroom full of chaos, an elderly person looking forward to a visit each day from a high school student, an elderly person that can't wait to have the newspaper read to them or have their nails painted, and more. These are all examples of some of the situations that our students at Dawson-Boyd experience as a Service Learning student. During this session I will share information on establishing a Service Learning Course in your school. We will discuss what is happening at Dawson-Boyd with our Service Learning program and how what we do can be implemented into your school.

Our program allows students to volunteer in service areas within our community (elementary school, high school, care center, assisted living, DAC center, etc.) I will share with you the standards that we use for our program, the requirements for our program, the packet that our high school students receive at the beginning of the school year and more. We will discuss credit(s) that students receive and how they earn those credits. We have a unique connection with our program where some of our students have the opportunity to be placed in our local hospital and spend one week (for a semester) in each department that our healthcare center offers (yes, it takes them the entire semester to cover all of the departments). Some of our students also have the opportunity to watch actual surgeries. Service Learning has been a part of the Dawson-Boyd curriculum for 35 years and we have perfected our program as we have grown.
