Critique of False Christian Doctrine Regarding Nailing the Law to the Cross

- The idea that the law was nailed to the cross is a false Christian doctrine.
- According to Matthew 5, not one jot or tittle of the Torah will pass away until all is fulfilled.
- The prophets, including the last great day of the feast and Passover, have not been fulfilled yet.
- Until all is fulfilled, not one part of the law will pass away.
- Christian pastors who promote the idea of nailing the law to the cross are promoting a contradictory and twisted belief.
- Colossians 2:14 is often misinterpreted to support the idea of nailing the law to the cross.
- However, the scripture does not mention anything about nailing the Torah to the cross.
- While something was nailed to the cross, it is not the law as commonly believed.

The Three Definitions of the Law

- The writer emphasizes that people often misunderstand what was nailed to the cross. It was not the entire law, but rather a "certificate of debt" that consisted of the decrees against us.
- The Bible refers to this misunderstanding as the "spirit of error."
- Within the law, there are three distinct definitions.
- The first definition is the Commandments, such as "Thou shalt not go over 55 miles an hour." These are the Ten Commandments and are part of what is commonly referred to as the law.
- The second definition is the ordinances. These are the technicalities of the law, such as the regulations that explain what is considered reckless driving.
 Ordinances are necessary because people do not always follow the Commandments.
- The purpose of the Torah, as mentioned in Galatians 3:19, was to be added to the law because of transgression. In other words, it was added because people were not able to fully understand and obey the spirit of the law.
- The writer suggests that those who are focused on the ordinances may lack the baptism of the Holy Spirit, which is needed to truly understand and keep the law.

Understanding the Structure of the Law

- The Ten Commandments and the Torah are foundational aspects of the law.
- Disregard of the commandments led to the addition of the Torah.
- The focus should be on loving and obeying God, rather than getting caught up in rules and regulations.

- Meditating on the law helps diminish the emphasis on ordinances.
- Decrees are the consequences or penalties for breaking the ordinances.
- The certificate of debt represents the decrees against those who have broken the law.
- Yeshua took upon himself the decrees of the law and nailed them to the cross, freeing believers from the consequences of their sins.
