#### I. Goal 1: All students will demonstrate growth across subject areas.

- A. **Measure:** all students will demonstrate average growth of 5 percentage points per year until the average score exceeds 85% as measured by the NWEA MAP Assessment ELA and mathematics growth measures.
- B. **Y1 Baseline:**
  1. For schoolwide, grade, and classroom averages, all were above the 5 or more growth points measure.
- C. **Y2:**
  1. For schoolwide, grade, and classroom averages, all were above the 5 or more growth points measure.
  2. From year 1 to year 2, the percentage of students performing at or above grade level in ELA improved from 30% to 54%.
  3. From year 1 to year 2, the percentage of students performing at or above grade level in math improved from 39% to 55%.
- D. **Charter Renewal Goal Backwards Mapping:** Monitor growth to ensure it stays above 5 points across all subgroups.

#### II. Goal 2: All students will demonstrate mathematical proficiency.

- A. **Measure:** Each year of the charter term, 80% of all students demonstrate grade level mastery in mathematics as indicated by their RIT score percentile falling within the nationally-normed percentile range for their grade level on the NWEA MAP assessment or similar nationally norm-referenced test.

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1. **Y1 Baseline (2022-23):** In Yr 1 (2022-23), 39% of scholars scored within the nationally-normed proficiency percentile range for their grade level on the NWEA MAP math assessment (as defined by 85th percentile or higher).
2. **Y2 Outcome (2023-24):** 55% of scholars (goal was 55%) scored within the nationally-normed proficiency percentile range for their grade level on the NWEA MAP math assessment (as defined by 85th percentile or higher).

### III. Goal 3: All students will demonstrate ELA proficiency.

- A. **Measure:** Each year of the charter term, 80% of all students demonstrate grade level mastery in reading as indicated by their RIT score percentile falling within the nationally-normed percentile range for their grade level on the NWEA MAP assessment or similar nationally norm-referenced test.
  1. **Y1 Baseline (2022-23):** 30% of scholars scored within the nationally-normed proficiency percentile range for their grade level on the NWEA MAP math assessment (as defined by 85th percentile or higher).
  2. **Y2 Outcome (2023-24):** 54% of scholars (goal was 45%) scored within the nationally-normed proficiency percentile range for their grade level on the NWEA MAP math assessment (as defined by 85th percentile or higher).

#### IV. **Goal 4: All students will participate in Entrepreneurial Project-based Learning.**

- A. Measure: Each year of the charter term, 80% of students will complete at least two entrepreneurial project-based learning experiences as indicated by grade level student portfolios.

#### V. **Goal 5: All families will engage as learning partners.**

- A. Measure: Each year of the charter term, an average of at least 80% of families have participated in at least one Learning Partnership Plan conference, as indicated by administrative records.

# Community Investment

The strength of our community continues to grow

## *Increasing Demand*

Since opening, community demand for attending our innovative school has continued to increase. In the current student recruitment cycle for SY24-25, DeKalb Brilliance has seen an 18.6% percent increase in applications when compared to our first year of operation, and a 40.7% percent increase in applications when compared to our founding year. DeKalb Brilliance is projecting that total applications for SY24-25 will approach ~525 by the end of the summer (for ~125 open seats).

# Academic results

Year 2: growth translates into proficiency gains

## Increasing % of Students on Grade level

In DeKalb Brilliance Academy's second year, the school's strong growth translated into proficiency gains. Across the school, the percent of students meeting the proficiency benchmark (85% percentile or above on the NWEA MAP assessment) improved:

- From year 1 to year 2, the percentage of students performing at or above grade level in math improved from 39% to 55%.
- From year 1 to year 2, the percentage of students performing at or above grade level in ELA improved from 30% to 54%.

## Cohort Analysis

Notably, the gains were strong with the students with the largest gaps: the same cohort of students that had previously had 78% of students reading at a pre-K level:

- From year 1 to year 2, the percentage of students performing at or above grade level in math improved from 17% to 41% for 3rd graders.
- From year 1 to year 2, the percentage of students performing at or above grade level in ELA improved from 10% to 32% for 3rd graders.

## Traditional School Comparison

DeKalb Brilliance Academy's performance is projected to outpace the other four elementary schools in the same zip code, which had 14% of 3rd grade students at or above grade level in reading (compared to 32% at DBA), and 17% of 3rd grade students at or above grade level in mathematics (compared to 41% at DBA) in the 2022-23 school year.



# Academic results

Year 1: a year of tremendous growth

## Incoming Scholars


DeKalb Brilliance opened in the 2022-23 school year. Opening a school so shortly after the COVID-19 pandemic, we expected to see that the brilliance of our children was not yet reflected in their academic performance.

80% of our incoming scholars entered below grade level, with the biggest gaps in our incoming second graders (78% of our incoming second graders entered our school reading at a pre-K level).



## Systematic Reading

Our two-teacher, systematic reading approach propelled our students growth. By the end of our first year, 64.9% of students had reached their goals or grown \*three or more\* reading levels.



## Accelerated Growth


DeKalb Brilliance has several national data proofpoints:
