

## Finding reliable, high-quality sources

## 1. Start with our online, subscription-based databases

These sources are searchable databases of published journals, newspapers and magazines. Because these sources are already vetted and peer-reviewed, you do not need to be concerned about filtering out unreliable information.

## 2. When searching on Google, try a variety of search terms

Be sure to vary your search terms, including keywords from your question or topic.
