It states the problem, objective, methods, summarizes the results of main finding, and conclusion from the research. Please do not use references and mathematical equations in abstract. Abstract is written in one paragraph and should be no more than 200 words in Bahasa and 150 words in English.

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Keywords: 3 – 5 word or phrase(s) that it's important; specific; semicolon; or representative for the article (Cambria, 10 pt)

Introduction

(spacing paragraph after enter once, space 1, 10 pt)

The introduction of the manuscript must be written in grammar checked and good language. State the objectives of the work and provide an adequate background, avoiding a detailed literature survey or a summary of the results. It is recommended when inserting the citations using a reference manager such as Mendeley and ensure that any references cited in the text are also found in the list of references (vice versa). Indicate references with author name and year published need to be put here with Mendeley Reference Manager, For example:

... The cold extraction can be used by sochletation methods ... (Rohyami, 2008).

Write background and objective in paragraph not in subsection. Introduction must be written using Cambria font 11 pt space 1. The paragraphs are intended to start 5-6 digits or 1.2 cm left indent.

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Methodology

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Research methods must be contained the materials and instruments used, and procedures. It can be written in subsection with sub-heading written with Capitalize Each Word, Cambria font, 11 pt, align left. Provide sufficient detail to allow the work to

be reproduced. Methods already published should be indicated by references: only relevant modifications should be described.

Material

For the chemical, please mention details of brand and purity.

Procedure

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Result and Discussion

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Results are presented in the form of graphs, tables, or descriptive. Analysis and interpretation of these results is required before they are discussed. Results should be clear and concise. This should explore the significance of the results of the work, not repeat them. A combined Results and Discussion section is often appropriate. Comparison of the the results and the research results reported in any previous published articles is important to be discussed. Avoid extensive citations and discussion of published literature.

The table is written in the middle or at the end of the text. If the width of the table is not enough to be written in half a page, it can be written a full page. Table title is written from left, all words are capitalized, except conjunctions. If more than one line is written in a single space (at least 12). For example, it can be seen in Table 1.

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The results are in the form of images, or data made by drawings/graphs/diagrams, the discussion also follows the existing rules; the caption of the image is placed under the image, from the left, and space 1 (at least 12) from the image. If more than 1 line, each line is given a single space, or at least 12. For example, it can be seen in Figure 1.

The discussion is focused on linking the data and the results of their analysis to the problem or research objective and the wider theoretical context. It can also answer about the facts found in the data.

The discussion is written next to the data discussed. The discussion is not to be separated from the data discussed.

Conclusion

Conclusions should answer the objectives of research. Do not repeat the Abstract, or just list experimental results. Provide a clear scientific justification for your work, and indicate possible applications and extensions. You should also suggest future experiments and/or point out those that are underway.

Acknowledgement

Collate acknowledgments in a separate section at the end of the article before the references and do not, therefore, include them on the title page, as a footnote to the title or otherwise. List here those individuals who provided help during the research (e.g., providing language help, writing assistance or proof reading the article, etc.).

Reference

Please ensure that every reference cited in the text is also present in the reference list (and vice versa). Any references cited in the abstract must be given in full. Unpublished results and personal communications are not recommended in the reference list but may

be mentioned in the text. If these references are included in the reference list, they should follow the standard reference style of the journal and should include a substitution of the publication date with either "Unpublished results" or "Personal communication" Citation of a reference as "in press" implies that the item has been accepted for publication.

As a minimum, the full URL should be given and the date when the reference was last accessed. Any further information, if known (DOI, author names, dates, reference to a source publication, etc.), should also be given. Web references can be listed separately (e.g., after the reference list) under a different heading if desired, or can be included in the reference list.

Text: Indicate references by number(s) in square brackets in line with the text. The actual authors can be referred to, but the reference number(s) must always be given. Example: "..... as demonstrated [3,6]. Barnaby and Jones [8] obtained a different result". List: Number the references (numbers in square brackets) in the list in the order in which they appear in the text. 6. The references used should be a minimum of **80% journal article** and also a minimum of 80% up to date reference (**maximum of 5 years**).
7. The manuscript is written max 8 pages using reference manager **Mendeley** with APA Reference Style

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
