**Jerry Berrier** (he/him) worked in the field of assistive technology for over 20 years after an 18-year career in human resources. He spent six years as an assistant manager at the Verizon Center for customers with disabilities, followed by seven years as an assistive technology consultant specializing in work with Deafblind consumers. Most recently, he ended a nine-year stint at the Perkins School for the

Blind in the field of assistive technology. He retired from full-time employment in June of 2021. Jerry is past president of the Bay State Council of the Blind and is currently co-chair of that organization's advocacy committee. His interests include audio production, accessible web design, and birding by ear. He has consulted on numerous accessibility projects with the Massachusetts Audubon Society, including fifteen all-persons trails projects. He has conducted birding by ear workshops and nature walks, both for blind and sighted audiences of all ages.

**María-Elena Montero** (she/her) is President of DC Bird Alliance, where her love of birds is rooted in the simple joy of being in nature. She delights in the magic of moments — chimney swifts spiraling at dusk, or a surprise flash of color in a city

park — and believes birds invite us to pause, connect, and belong. For her, birding is less about checklists and more about wonder, community, and the reminder to always look up.

**Qudsiya Naqui** (she/her) is a former board member for the Metro Washington Association of Blind Athletes (MWABA), a nonprofit organization that creates sports and recreational opportunities for blind and low-vision residents of the DC, Maryland, and Virginia metro area. Qudsiya launched MWABA's hiking program in 2021, which has enabled dozens of blind and low vision nature enthusiasts to explore local, national, and state parks. She was proud to partner with the DC Bird Alliance to facilitate MWABA's participation in the inaugural National Blind Birder Bird-A-Thon sponsored by Birdability. In addition to her love of mountain trails, Qudsiya is an avid runner and tandem cyclist. She has completed four marathons and two century bike rides. She is also the creator and host of <u>Down to the Struts</u>, a podcast about disability and design, where she amplifies the expertise and advocacy of others in the disability community dedicated to creating a more just, equitable, and accessible world.

**Donna Posont** (she/her) is an Environmental Interpretive Center staff member and UM-Dearborn alumna, and has been honored for her work as an inclusive naturalist educator and advocate, including her monthly program called *Birding by Ear and Beyond*. It's held one Saturday each month. During the program, Posont leads visually-impaired people through 120 acres of campus forest. Attendees learn to tell the sometimes subtle differences between bird species. They also learn how each fits into their habitat. "The world is designed for sighted people, but nature is a place where it's okay to be blind," Posont told The Washington Post. "You can use your other senses to learn why birds and nature are important and how it all works (as one). To me, that's the beauty of it." Posont is 67. She has been blind since second grade. She was born with retinitis pigmentosa, a degenerative condition that affects the back wall of the eye.
