Theme; WATER

Leader: God, come to our assistance

All: O Lord, make haste to help us.

Introduction

Season of Creation is a time when we reflect on the importance of creation and the creator. Every creation has a meaning and function that teaches us the importance of gratitude, nurturing and protecting creation. In the first week of Season of Creation, we have been made to realize how creation plays an important role in our lives. The concept of first fruits derives from God's creation work. Because God created everything that exists, all of creation belongs to him ([Psalm 24:1](#)). Consequently, that which is first and best belongs to him and is to be given to him.

God's creative power and ownership of all, the Bible instructs believers to give God the best of the animal sacrifices (see Lev. 1-5). The land is also viewed as a gift from God and the best of it, its "first fruits, " is to be given to him — crops ([Exodus 23:16](#) [Exodus 23:19](#)), the wheat harvest ([Exod 34:22](#) ; [Lev 2:14](#) ; [23:20](#)), olive oil ([Num 18:12](#) ; [Deut 18:4](#)), the finest new wine ([Num 18:12](#) ; [Deut 18:4](#)), honey ([2 Chron 31:5](#)), sheep wool ([Deut 18:4](#)), and fruit ([Neh 10:35](#)). The Old Testament makes it clear that everything that God's people have is to be viewed as from God and gained through his providence ([Psalm 50:10](#)). In this season of Creation, we want to reflect on all the element of the “firstfruits.” For the first week we reflected on the element of light.

For this second week we want to reflect on water. Water is often seen as a powerful symbol of cleansing and purification in biblical teachings. Its symbolic significance lies in its ability to purify and wash away impurities, both physical and spiritual. In ancient times, water was used in various ritual practices to signify the cleansing of sins and the renewal of one's spiritual state.

The act of baptism, for instance, involves immersing oneself in water as a symbolic representation of being cleansed of one's sins and starting afresh. The act of being submerged in water and then rising up out of it signifies a transformation from the old self to a new self, purified and forgiven. It is a public declaration of faith and a commitment to follow Jesus. This symbolism is deeply rooted in biblical teachings and can be seen in various passages.

Opening Prayer

Creator, we turn our attention to acknowledge and give thanks for Your gift of water. The mighty seas, the calm lakes, the rivers, the streams, and the rain that falls to refresh our sister mother earth. At the beginning of creation, You sanctified the waters. Your gift is indispensable to all life on earth. It grows our food; it sustains all living things physically. Reading: 1 Peter 3:18-22

For Christ also suffered for sins once, the righteous for the sake of the unrighteous, that he might lead you to God. Put to death in the flesh, he was brought to life in the spirit. After being made alive, he went and made proclamation to the imprisoned spirit to those who were disobedient long ago waited patiently in the days of Noah while the ark was being built. In it only a few people, eight in all, were saved through water, and this water symbolizes baptism that now saves you also not the removal of dirt from the body but the pledge of a clear conscience toward God. It saves you by the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers subject to him.

Reflection:

Water reveals our sense of identity (the who), our sense of place (the where), and our meaning and purpose in the world (the why). And underlying all of these deeply human questions lies a central question of ethics—what does it mean to flourish in the world as a human being? The quality of the water we encounter in our daily lives is one way to think about human flourishing and what it means to thrive in a particular place. “Water quality has a striking effect on all aspects of life,” explains Shockley. One of his research interests involves water quality, specifically the process of groundwater remediation. One feature of this process involves “an examination of different conceptions of what ‘success’ in water remediation looks like for different groups of people.” The varying ideas regarding success tell us much about identity, about who we are and how we understand our relationship to the world around us, and how different groups view themselves and their role in the world. He has been struck by the different ways water is viewed regionally in the US: “When New Yorkers hear that I work on water issues, they instantly think about pollution; by contrast, Coloradans think of water rights.” Both intuitions point to notions of flourishing and the significance of water in localized environments. Water symbolizes cleansing and purification in biblical teachings. In the biblical context water represents life and rebirth. In some cultures and religions, water is associated with spiritual cleaning. As a Christian in our Baptism, water is symbolizing new life and rebirth.

Just as water is the source of life, God has willed that this same water be the source of the baptismal renewal of all humanity in Christ. Water, together with other natural elements such as wheat, grapes and olive oil, form the basis of the sacraments and, therefore, of the economy of salvation. If they were to be lacking, we would also lack the means by which God offers and gives us His salvation. Saving the destruction of nature, in addition to helping life on the planet, prevents the sacramental doors to salvation from being closed.
