- 1. Follow these <u>instructions</u> to ensure you have completed the task for at least 15 volcanoes around the world (remember to use a google shortener to link us to your information).
- 2. Within your map you want to embed on your blog, click on the three dots in a vertical line to the right of 'Add layer.'
- 3. In the drop-down menu, click on embed on my site.
- 4. Copy this HTML code (Control-C)
- 5. Within your new blog post, ensure you are within 'HTML' (not 'Compose').
- 6. Paste the HTML code where you want it to appear (before/ after your blog post).
- 7. When you click back to the 'Compose' screen, your map should appear.
