

## Year at a Glance - 9/10 English Language Arts

### What Students Learn

As students move from eighth grade to high school, critical thinking and writing become even more essential to student success. Through engaging in the writing process, students develop skills over the two years resulting in their independent ability to: 1) write arguments, analyze substantive topics and texts, introduce and distinguish claims, organize writing to establish relationships, and provide evidence for those claims, and 2) write informative/explanatory texts to examine and convey complex ideas by introducing a topic or thesis statement and presenting information clearly and accurately. Through practicing these genres of writing, students will be able to produce coherent writing in which the development, organization, and style are appropriate to task, purpose, and audience. Furthermore, students continue to write narratives with well-structured event sequences.

In literature and informational texts, ninth and tenth graders cite strong and thorough evidence to support analysis of what the text says. Students identify a theme or central idea of a text and analyze its development and detail. It is essential for students to determine the meaning of words and phrases as they are used in a text, including figurative and connotative meanings. Students continue to work on incorporating an author's point of view, as well as delineate and evaluate the argument and specific claims in a text, determining whether the reasoning is valid and the evidence is relevant.

Students and teachers use collaborative conversations to engage with grade level topics, build on ideas, and express ideas clearly. Not all conversations are structured and should allow for reflection to support students' opinions. Students clearly present information, findings, and supporting evidence. They continue to adapt their speech to a variety of content and tasks to demonstrate a command of formal English.

### Overview of Depth of Mastery

- Demonstrate command of the conventions of English grammar and usage (parallel structure, various types of phrases, clauses to convey specific meanings, semicolon, colon, and proper spelling), make effective choices for meaning and style according to context; follow the conventions of a style manual, and demonstrate an understanding of figurative language (euphemism & oxymoron), word relationship, and nuances in word meanings (words with similar denotations).
