ATF Offers \$5,000 Reward in Gun Store Burglary 17 Firearms Stolen From Qwik Cash Pawn

**BUFORD, Ga.** –-(Ammoland.com)- Special Agent in Charge Scott Sweetow of the Atlanta Field Division, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) today announced ATF is offering a reward of up to \$5,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the persons responsible for the theft of firearms occurring at federal firearms licensee (FFL) Buck-N-Bass located at 4901 Summer Oak Drive, Gwinnett County, Ga. on Sept. 14. "The burglary and theft of firearms from an FFL is a very serious crime and a top priority for ATF," said Sweetow. "Having investigated similar cases in the past, we know stolen firearms are used in furtherance of drug- and gang-related activities and are utilized by violent criminals to perpetrate additional crimes."

During the early morning hours on Sept. 14, Buck-N-Bass, was burglarized by unknown persons. The suspect(s)

used a stolen pickup truck to smash into the front door and wall of the business gaining entry. Numerous firearms consisting of handguns and rifles were stolen. There's no further information or description of the suspect(s) or crime available at this time.

## Railroad police look for 120 stolen rifles

Police are looking for thieves who stole a cache of rifles from an Atlanta rail yard.

Railroad shipping company CSX officials said 120 rifles of different calibers were stolen two weeks ago from a shipping container.

CSX has its own police agency that patrols the railroad's 21,000-mile network, and those officers are leading the investigation with aid from other agencies.

Spokesman Gary Sease would not specify what type of weapons – whether they were military-style assault rifles or hunting rifles – were taken.
