

RESOURCES

More in Common has produced a report called <u>The Connection Opportunity</u> on how to build societies and communities that are stronger, more united, and more resilient. Faith spaces play a key role in this. They identify seven key elements in their recommendations:

- 1. Provide more opportunities for people to connect across difference.
- 2. Increase the perception that connecting across difference is the "community norm."
- 3. Foster local community belonging.
- 4. Focus on commonalities, like shared interests and goals, to broaden the appeal of bridging activities.
- 5. Reduce intergroup anxiety.
- 6. Emphasize the importance of "connective responsibility."
- 7. Seek opportunities to create "connection cascades."
