






























El dorado Drive by Megan Abbott [Fiction Abbott]





Djinn Patrol and the Purple Line by Deepa Anapparna



readers deep into this neighborhood to trace the unfolding of a tragedy through the eyes of a child as he has his first perilous collisions with an unjust and complicated wider world.


Between a Flock and a Hard Place [Mystery Andrews]


Death of a Smuggler by M.C. Beaton [Mystery Beaton]

Dead in Long Beach California by Venita Blackburn [Fiction Blackburn]



Over the course of one week, Coral, the successful yet lonely author of a hit dystopian novel, Wildfire, becomes increasingly untethered from reality. Blindsided by grief and operating with reckless determination, she doubles --and triples--down on posing as her brother, risking not only her own sanity but her relationship with her precocious niece, Khadijah. As Coral's swirl of lies slowly closes in on her, the quirky and mysterious alien world of Wildfire becomes enmeshed in her own reality, in the process pushing long-buried memories, traumas, and secrets

dangerously into the present.

The Princess of Las Vegas by Chris Bohjalian [Fiction Bohjalian]

Virginia, 1864--Libby Steadman's husband has been away for so long that she can barely conjure his voice in her dreams. While she longs for him in the night, fearing him dead in a Union prison camp, her days are spent running a gristmill with her teenage niece, a hired hand, and his wife, all the grain they can produce requisitioned by the Confederate Army. It's an uneasy life in the Shenandoah Valley, the territory frequently changing hands, control swinging back and forth like a pendulum between North and South, and Libby awakens every morning expecting to see her land a battlefield. And then she finds a gravely injured Union officer left for dead in a



neighbor's house, the bones of his hand and leg shattered. Captain Jonathan Weybridge of the Vermont Brigade is her enemy--but he's also a human being, and Libby must make a terrible decision: Does she leave him to die alone? Or does she risk treason and try to nurse him back to health? And if she succeeds, does she try to secretly bring him across Union lines, where she might negotiate a trade for news of her own husband?


Small Game by Blair Braverman [Mystery Braverman]

Don't Forget Me, Little Besie by James Lee Burke [Mystery Burke]

At the beginning of the twentieth century, as America grapples with forces of human and natural violence more powerful than humanity has ever seen, Bessie Holland yearns for the love that she has never known. She finds a soulmate and mentor in a brilliant but tormented suffragette English teacher, who inspires Bessie to fight the forces of evil that permeate her world. Watching the vast Texas countryside being destroyed by an oil company and a menacing figure with a violent past, Bessie is prepared to defend her home and her family. But when she accidentally kills an unarmed man to defend her father Hackberry, she must flee to New York. There, her



older brother introduces her to boys who will grow into gangsters, but as children admire and respect Bessie's spirit and fortitude as she is cast into a gangland that yearns for justice and mercy.


Fall by Tracy Clark [Mystery Clark]





He's found it, more or less: he's built a relationship with a local woman, Lena, and he's gradually turning Trey Reddy from a half-feral teenager into a good kid going good places. But then Trey's long-absent father reappears, bringing along an English millionaire and a scheme to find gold in the townland, and suddenly everything the three of them have been building is under threat. Cal and Lena are both ready to do whatever it takes to protect Trey, but Trey doesn't want protecting. What she wants is revenge.



Missing White Woman by Kellye Garrett [Mystery Garrett]



It was supposed to be a romantic getaway weekend in New York City. Breanna's new boyfriend, Ty, took care of everything-the train tickets, the dinner reservations, the rented four-story luxury rowhouse in Jersey City with a beautiful view of the Manhattan skyline. But when Bree comes downstairs their final morning, she's shocked. There's a stranger laying dead in the foyer, and Ty is nowhere to be found. A Black woman alone in a new city, Bree is stranded and out of her depth-especially when it becomes clear the dead woman is none other than Janelle Beckett, the missing woman the entire Internet has become obsessed with. There's only one person Bree can turn to: her ex-best friend, a lawyer with whom she shares a very complicated past. 
The Return of Ellie Black by Emiko Jean [Fiction Jean]


A Bad Day for Sunshine by Dayrynda Jones [Mystery Jones]

Deus X by Stephen Mack Jones [Mystery Jones] *Michigan Author*




Bright Young Women by Jessica Knoll [Fiction Knoll]

refer to as the All-American Sex Killer--and that he's struck again. Determined to find justice, the two join forces as their search for answers leads to a final, shocking confrontation.






Smoke Kings by Jahmal Mayfield [Mystery Mayfield]

This is a tale of murder.




The God of the Woods by Liz Moore [Fiction Moore]


You Know What You Did by K.T. Nguyen [Fiction Nguyen]

questions, but with her mind increasingly fractured, Annie doesn't have answers. All she knows is this: She will do anything to protect her daughter--even if it means losing herself.


The Thursday Murder Club by Richard Osman [Mystery Osman]




The Truth About the Devlins by Lisa Scotoline [Fiction Scottoline]

This is why We Lied by Karin Slaughter [Mystery Slaughter]




Everyone on this Train is a Suspect by Benjamin Stevenson


Listen for the Lie by Amy Tintera [Mystery Tintera]


The Woman in Suite 11 by Ruth Ware [Fiction Ware]
