This conference offers an opportunity for students of all levels to engage in academic discourse and gain experience at academic conferences.

Our theme this year is “End Times.” As many of us grapple with a sense of impending doom, dreading myriad futures, we find some solace in reimagining a peaceful past. Through technological advancement, we can exchange our drab reality for a natural beauty most accessible through stories and screens. Some fields of interest include Futurisms, Memory Studies, Creative Writing, Personal Narratives, Critical Theory, History, Philosophy, Geography, Psychology, Gender and Sexuality Studies, Cultural Studies, Genre Studies, Film Studies, and Literary Studies.

Papers touching on any of these ideas are welcome. We look forward to seeing your research and hope to foster productive discussions surrounding these topics.

Submitting Abstracts

For creative or critical presentations, please send a 200-to-300-word abstract as a .doc or .pdf attachment to theacaciagroup.csuf@gmail.com by **February 21st, 2025**. In your email, please include your name, institution, and academic standing (undergraduate, graduate, doctoral student, professor, or independent scholar). Please include a brief third person bio of up to 50

words. If your abstract is accepted, you will be asked to confirm your commitment to attend the conference and, at least ten days before the conference, to email a draft or outline of your presentation to your panel coordinator. Each presenter will be given 10 to 12 minutes to present at the conference. To propose a panel, please send a 200 to 300-word panel explanation as a .doc or .pdf attachment, including its title, topic, and format, as well as the abstracts for each presentation, listing each presenter's name, institution, and academic standing.
