The Law, Public Safety, Corrections, and Security (LPSCS) program at Ware County High School provides students with an opportunity to explore and engage in a pathway aligned with their interests and aptitude. Unlike a selective process, enrollment in this program is based on individual preferences and capabilities.

Upon entering as freshmen, all students undergo the YouScience Career Aptitude Assessment, a tool designed to identify suitable pathways corresponding to their career aspirations. Using the insights gleaned from this assessment, students craft their high school graduation and post-secondary plans, enabling informed decision-making when registering for courses. Registration for existing students commences in March, ensuring ample time for planning and scheduling.

Regular engagements with school counselors afford students ongoing guidance regarding the benefits of the "Criminal Justice" pathway. Our counseling department remains abreast of evolving post-graduation opportunities associated with this pathway by actively participating in CTAE (Career, Technical, and Agricultural Education) pathway workshops and training sessions.

For incoming freshmen, the process follows a slightly different trajectory. Since these students have not undergone the YouScience assessment, pathway enrollment is primarily driven by individual interests. Preceding freshman registration, eighth-graders from Ware County and Waycross Middle School embark on tours of the CTAE Department, culminating in a Parent Night where CTAE pathways are introduced, and teachers are on hand to address queries.

The LPSCS program is promoted within Ware County High School. Annual exhibits are erected during registration periods, accompanied by the distribution of brochures detailing the offerings of the LPSCS Pathway and SkillsUSA. Further promotional efforts include dissemination through students, school counselors, hallway bulletin boards and school websites.
