❖ FedStats

Provides statistical data from over 100 government agencies. Access is available by agency or by topic.

Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS)

Statistics found here include employment and unemployment rates, and consumer price index, wholesaler price index and producer price index, consumer expenditure, labor productivity and much more.

❖ American Time and Use Survey

The American Time Use Survey provides information about "the amount of time people spend doing various activities, such as paid work, childcare, volunteering, and socializing."

Consumer Expenditure Survey

The Consumer Expenditure Survey provides data about the buying habits of American consumers. It is the only Federal survey that provides information on the complete range of consumers' expenditures and incomes, and the characteristics of those consumers.

HUD State of the Cities Data System (SOCDS)

A ton of free research that you can use to better understand your target market. Best of all, the site has a sleek UI and interactive charts that reveal more granular data as you hover over certain elements.

USAFacts

Nonpartisan site created by former Microsoft CEO Steve Ballmer to make government statistics easier to find and interpret. Includes government finance data, population and demographics, and government impact.

Wisconsin Department of Transportation Traffic Counts

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) provides traffic counts via an interactive map that allows you to view counts anywhere in the state. Also provides traffic forecasting, a useful tool when considering potential business site planning and traffic at a given location.

Wayback Machine

Starting in 1996, the Wayback Machine has been building a digital library of Internet sites and other cultural artifacts in digital form. Like a paper library, we provide free access to researchers, historians, scholars, people with print disabilities, and the general public. This is a great way to "see" stats that otherwise might be lost to time, such as Chamber of Commerce membership numbers, businesses that are no longer in operation, and policy changes.
