### Activities

In addition to monthly meetings, RPBBA has a series of activities including the Honeybee Festival, Educational Committee, holiday potlucks, club picnics, manning a booth at the state fair, etc. We encourage you to volunteer and be active in the events of your association. We have a strong core of dedicated volunteers who care deeply about our little pollinators and we are always welcoming to new members who want to *bee* involved. Do not be an introvert, step out of your shell and volunteer. You may find it is as rewarding as working with your colonies!

### Beginner Beekeeping Classes

Each Winter, usually beginning in January, RPBBA conducts a beginner beekeeping class. These classes are overseen by Master Beekeepers and are taught by members of our club. The classes are usually held over four full Saturdays and are conducted in conjunction with other area beekeeping clubs. So, if you miss a class at RPBBA, you can probably make it up at another local club. Cost is very reasonable and includes books, copies of slides and over 20 hours of classroom sessions.

## State and Regional Conferences

RPBBA is very well represented at the state level (Virginia Beekeepers Association) and with the Eastern Apiary Society (EAS). As a member of RPBBA, we encourage you to be active in beekeeping at all levels and look forward to seeing you at the State of Virginia Conferences.

## Voting

As a club member, we encourage you to vote on important club matters. Votes can be cast in person or by electronic ballot. We usually inform the membership at club meetings about important topics that require a vote and send out an electronic form to conduct the election. We encourage you to *bee* informed and vote! Each member has one vote. If you have a family membership, your family is entitled to one vote for the family.

## Master Beekeeper Certification

RPBBA encourages all beekeepers to gain a deeper understanding of beekeeping and is dedicated to helping beekeepers become Certified Master Beekeepers. There are three levels in the program: Apprentice Beekeeper, Journeyman Beekeeper and Master Beekeeper. RPBBA helps members with study groups and through the monthly educational programs. ## Master Beekeeper Study Groups

Study groups for Apprentice, Journeyman, and Master Beekeeper are held on the third Monday of the month. Attendance is free and you are encouraged to print a copy of the study guide (found on the Virginia Beekeepers website) and follow along in the discussions. Even if you are not quite ready to jump on the Master Beekeeper track, these study groups are a great tool for learning about bees.

## Public Outreach Engagements

RPBBA is an association dedicated to education and that includes the public. As a member, we encourage you to learn about beekeeping and we also encourage you to teach others about beekeeping. Some opportunities that we encounter are volunteering to work at the Chesterfield Bee Festival or the state fair, speaking at community and civic organizations about the importance of bees, etc. Teaching is a great way to master a subject and at RPBBA, there are lots of opportunities to educate the public.
