<u>WLC Vision of the Graduate:</u> The WLC Graduate will be an effective communicator, a strong collaborator, a creative problem solver, a self-directed learner, and a responsible citizen.

<u>Course Description:</u> Honors US History is a course designed to engage students in an intense examination of American history beginning with the Civil War. This course will focus on the economic, social, cultural, and political movements that have influenced the course of American history, while at the same time promoting an understanding of our role in an interdependent world. As this is an honors course, a bigger emphasis will be placed on individual reading and writing intensive lessons and assessments. Throughout this course students will work on a yearlong portfolio assessment, which will include formative checkpoints and a culminating summative assessment at the end of the school year.

<u>Course Text:</u> Prentice Hall's "United States History: Reconstruction to the Present" is available as a classroom resource, but not as an assigned reading text. Most class readings are carefully selected primary and secondary sources that help provide insight into the historical context and viewpoints of each unit or topic. These will all be available on Google Classroom throughout each unit.

These will be cumulative exams that include a variety of questions types including, but not limited to: multiple choice, fill in the blank, and written responses. Per school policy, midterms and finals can NOT be remediated.
