## Service Learning is integrated throughout the curriculum.

• De La Salle High School adopted Service Learning as its model in 1998. Since that time, all departments and teachers are both invited and encouraged to implement at least one Service Learning component into their curriculum. Currently there are a number of well-established Service Learning units that are incorporated across the curriculum, including the SIP (Sophomore Immersion Program) experience in Sophomore Religion, hygiene kits for the homeless in the Freshman Health classes, the Cereal Drive and Environmental Biology service learning project in the sophomore biology classes, and numerous other Service Learning units throughout the departments. The Service Learning Coordinator works as a resource for teachers in developing their units, and keeps a record (formerly on a curriculum map) of Service Learning projects across each grade level. In addition, various clubs on campus also include service into their work as a club, e.g., Jefferson Awards Club, Lasallian Youth, NHS, CSF.
