Why Multimodal Tools? What Can They *Do* for Us?

Modalities include “visual, audio, gestural, spatial, or linguistic means of creating meaning” (Selfe 195). Therefore, multimodal assignments are those which encourage students to work with more than one modality to achieve an intended purpose. Such assignments encourage students to think of composition in an expansive way, moving beyond the written word, allowing them to explore and practice using “all the available means of persuasion” (Aristotle).

Audio

The digital age allows us to re-evaluate orality and the power of sound in the classroom. These tools allow individuals to record and share sounds easily. Assignments can include music or music composition, recorded presentations/speeches/performances, or even the podcast genre, and much more.

Social Media and Tagging

While many digital tools have a social component (i.e. shareable), some tools are designed with community and audience specifically in mind. Many of these allow you to make open or closed groups and use hashtags (#) to help organize materials.

GIFs

Animated gifs are brief looping animations; they are easy to share and make. Often used to convey reactions, gifs are visual, moving, and silent. They can be incorporated into note-taking activities, interpretive assignments, and so on.
