

RJB met with Susan Bustetter, Elaine Nelson, Kat Sackman and Amy Betz Wednesday, Dec. 4. This group is working on the Fields of Study project, which is bigger and more inclusive than our project which is interested in research only. However the team says our data can be incorporated into the large data pool from which a research only search function can be created. That's the good news. The other news is that the Fields of Study project is not as well defined as ours and therefore on a slower trajectory. I have stated we want phase one "breathing on it's own" by the graduation and maybe the web team can use our project as a pilot to help the Fields of Study people (Jeff Antonellis Lapp and (second faculty member's name slips my mind) formulate an actionable plan for their larger project.

I think this is the way to go - a comprehensive data source with the research piece having it's own graphic identity to appeal to our constituents: students and alumni with possible secondary audiences being the government relations, media relations and admissions.

I have shared this developing document with the web team so that they can understand the scope of our project as well as some of the underlying communication strategy and user interface desires.

Good News: this group of four will incorporate our project into their work on the larger repository.

Challenges: the larger repository project is not well enough defined for real projection to begin. I'll try to push our work to the fore in hopes it will help the /fields of study team define their project and we can all move forward together. Randy, you are a key connector between these two projects and your facilitation skills will be critical to making sure Open Source Evergreen doesn't disappear into the undefined other.

Speaking of OSE - the term "open source" defines something that our project is not - free software. The urging of the web team is that we do not use this name. I remarked that the title "Fields of Study" means something else also and it is entirely unsuited to the product it hopes to represent.

Let's talk about a better name for our project so the branding is very clear.

## Overview

**Problem:** Through the years students have begun and completed projects and research across a range of subjects. Today students continue to come to Evergreen eager to explore topics researched by countless Greeners before them. Political economy, sustainable agriculture, mycelium, feminism, and documentary media are popular examples of recurring themes.

Unfortunately, works started and completed by previous students are forgotten, disappear, or are simply never captured. Because of this current students only hear of the school's legacy, but are seldom able to interact with it.

**Resolution:** We propose building and maintaining an open online repository of research papers and documentation of projects written by former Evergreen students. In the repository students will be able to make available completed projects, ongoing projects, and projects that have stalled. Attached to each project will be contacts, notes, documentation of the project itself, and other information that will render it relevant.

This project has four major phases:

- 1, build the infrastructure;
- 2, populate an initial repository by collecting research papers from alumni and faculty written in the last forty years of the school's existence;
- 3, make public through a media launch
- 4, maintain and collect current and future projects.

In doing so this repository will make available past research that current and future participants in the community can gain insight from--rather than going down the same research path over and over. Additionally, this repository is intended to establish an academic discussion that spans the college's life and solidifies academia at Evergreen.

**Vision:** Create a dynamic collection within the Library of past research, offered in an open source format (think "wikipedia") for current and future student and alumni researchers:

- Forty years of research, unearthed, categorized and made public in an attractive, easy-to-find & use, web-based location
- A legacy collection for alumni and current students to access, appreciate and possibly point the way to future research.
- Create a culture of current scholarship standing on the shoulders of past work, enabling current students to better chart their paths through their education.
- Acknowledge and showcase the research done by alumni during their student years
- Be a relevant piece of infrastructure in connecting students with their intentions

## **Benefits**

Overall, there are many benefits in launching and maintaining this project for Evergreen: compiles a wealth of community resources within a current communication platform; makes accessible Evergreen's legacy; and provides a way for students and alumni to not only give back, but to also be seen and celebrated. Fundamentally, this catalog builds upon the school's commitment to fostering 'a community of learning.'

**Student Engagement:** Creates avenues for student/alumni contact, mutual appreciation and community-building, internships, career and academic networking and mentoring etc

### **Student Organizations:**

Enables student groups such as the CPJ and GSU to house their research, organizational development, annual plans, budgets, achievements & best practices such that these organizations can stand on the shoulders of past student leaders.

**Alumni Engagement:** Potential tool for discovery, engagement, cultivation and stewardship.

- Connect with talented/successful alumni
- Build authentic relationships with alumni focused around non-monetary contributions to Evergreen's identity/community
- Celebrate/acknowledge/and curate the hard work they did at evergreen
- Build a rapport with alumni around their passions

I'd love to work on this. I'm always looking at various systems of content management, and have noticed that many organizations are using GitHub pages, which are free essentially static pages freely hosted. What's interesting about this scheme is that it doesn't need administrators as much as a hosted content management system like Wordpress or Drupal. Rather, I think users can commit their documents to a repository which would come under restriction by an admin only if something were inappropriate. But we'd also need search functionality, so I'll check that out. We could also host something at school, but I'm not sure whether that's the best option - it could be sensitive to school politics in that case.

Stay in touch. I'd like to know the parameters of the project - i.e. how the repository would be used, who can submit, whether we need features beyond search, whether we would need administrators.
