Course Description:

This course introduces students to the fundamentals of journalism as a core component of communication arts. Students will explore journalism's role in society and its connection to media, ethics, and storytelling. Through writing, interviewing, research, and visual storytelling, students will develop the practical skills necessary for producing news articles and editorial content. The course culminates in the creation of a professional-level journalistic project, preparing students for future studies in communication arts and media-related fields.
