My phone buzzed. I checked Twitter. I saw the tweet.

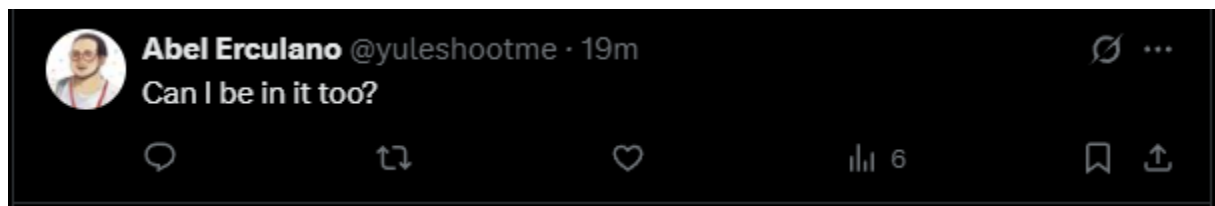
I blinked once.
