With climate change altering temperatures and rainfall and increasing the frequency of natural disasters, food will become harder to grow. These are wicked problems that can only be solved through collaboration and leadership.

This project collaborates with local and state government partners, exploring the role of local government in enabling resilient food systems and a sustainable food future for South Australians. As the closest level of government to the people, Local Government are well-placed to step into a leadership role, hosting conversations with their communities about how they can strengthen their local food system. This reduces dependence on distant food sources, ensures access to affordable, nutritious food, generates local jobs and protects the environment for future generations.

Vision and strategic thinking: (up to 500 words) Demonstrate how the nomination: contributes to the strategic plan and visionary future for the council and the community anticipates and plans for future organisation needs.

In 2020, an emerging group called the Food Systems Network were successful in obtaining a grant from the Local Government Association's Research and Development Scheme for a project called Local government: Enabling resilient food systems in South Australia.

The project aims to engage local government, communities and stakeholders in building the resilience of local food systems in the face of climate change risks.

A consultancy team, Ethical Fields, in partnership with Sustain and Collaborative Futures, were successful in their tender to work on the project with six local councils, on behalf of councils across South Australia.

One of the key objectives is to provide a guide for local governments to support them to understand their role in enabling local food systems. All of the resources developed will contribute to building the capacity of local government staff, elected members and communities to value local food systems, remove barriers and support climate-resilient initiatives.

Part of the strategic approach of this project is to embed the tools, techniques and knowledge across councils and networks within South Australia. With the development of a local food system presentation pack, any local or regional government will have the ability to replicate the processes that will develop the tools and information needed to play an integral role in improving the food system in their local area.

The actions and role clarification for local governments will help them determine their future investment and resourcing to more effectively enable resilient food

systems. The project will validate existing strategic actions and forge new commitments in council plans.

The ambition of the project to embed tools, techniques and knowledge into Councils across SA is a work in progress. However the project has already demonstrated how this can be achieved through exploring existing models from other states and countries, developing understanding of local and regional context and dynamics and by undertaking targeted engagement across community, industry and government partners including, importantly, with council staff working in complementary areas. The project has shown that there is a role for councils in supporting and encouraging sustainable and resilient food systems and demonstrated a process whereby relevant strategic objectives can be progressed and eventually extended formally through development of administrative levers, such as food policies.

Ultimately, embedding deliverable and sustainable actions within local government strategic plans and policies can help remove barriers and facilitate collaboration between Councils, community and industry. The project has shown effective processes and engagement strategies that enable diverse sector players to work towards the same goal of the benefit of the whole community.

Our Local Food Systems workshops were hosted by four councils; City of Onkaparinga, Mount Barker District Council, Alexandrina Council and City of Marion.

Participants representing the local food system (from farmers to consumers and beyond) in addition to general community were invited to consider what a healthy and sustainable food system would look like for their local area; how it could drive climate change action, support local jobs, reduce food waste and connect us as diverse communities?

The workshops were well attended by 140 participants representing a diverse cross-section of the food system. Each workshop co-created a local food vision, a set of supporting actions for priority areas, and mapped current and/or future considerations. The

level of engagement and participation was very high and the feedback received was extremely positive. Participants valued being asked to provide input into the process but also to learn and collaborate with others working or interested in food systems. 74% of participants reported experiencing a moderate or substantial improvement in their understanding of their local food system as a result. This was due to the time given to engage with the issue, hearing from a diverse group of people, sharing stories and building awareness of the different parts and actors of the system and how they are interconnected. Workshop materials will now be developed into a guide (that will be accessible on the Local Government Association webpage) to help local governments: •understand, advocate for and foster local food

- understand, advocate for and foster local food systems
- •identify and prioritise the best ways to invest and promote local food system initiatives
- develop and embed relevant food systems policy and planning as part of governments' response to climate change risks.

A significant achievement has been the cross-organisational collaboration. Even prior to the funding, the project was co-designed by local and state government partners; from engagement of a consultancy team, to the planning and facilitation of each workshop and the ongoing sharing of learning. It has strengthened existing relationships and built new ones, that will continue beyond the life of the project, supporting the sustainability of outcomes and future opportunities. Participating and supporting councils will now help other councils wishing to undertake a similar process.

Delivery of the project also saw the upskilling of council staff in engagement, facilitation, research, reporting and evaluation. The tools and techniques learnt provides ongoing sustainability and capacity. An important outcome was that staff from different sections of councils were involved; from community development, sustainability, economic development, environmental health and planning. Each were able to consider how their areas impact the food system.

Other achievements included:

- an increase in community garden and food swap networks,
- increased skill development in advocacy, volunteering, administration and community governance
- community groups applying for food and gardening projects.

For example, the City of Holdfast Bay saw an increase of requests for community garden support letters with groups applying for grants to deliver new education and climate change projects. This has been directly attributable to connecting with this project.

South Australia is currently home to a vibrant food industry, producing a wide variety of high quality fruits, vegetables, grains, meats and seafood. The value to the SA economy, sourced from the National Institute of Economic and Industry Research (NIEIR) for 2018-19 includes 51,619 jobs in agriculture and food and beverage manufacturing with \$15,672.24 value of output (\$M) and \$11,145.99 of exports (\$M).

The project highlighted how important sustainable food systems are to the regional economy and the role that they play in supporting community wellbeing through the provision of local employment opportunities, availability of healthy food options and reduction of food miles. It highlighted the threats to food related businesses but also opportunities for collaboration, building knowledge around food culture and the 'eat and shop local' message. The value above and beyond pure economics for a healthy community raises the need for better information and procedures to help prioritise the ways government, stakeholders and communities can support and promote the benefits of local food initiatives. The development and implementation of government policy and guidance materials to increase support in the local food production and logistics sector will benefit the community. With the aim to assist in problem solving (e.g. current Covid supply chain issues) before a community is negatively affected, the project identifies roles that local government can play.

In addition, this project has created a space for food system stakeholders to nominate their roles in enabling resilient food systems and identify where local government can remove unnecessary barriers or "red tape". This information assists local governments to avoid duplication, better utilise local resources within Council projects and enable community action towards a resilient food system.

The research produced from this project offers resources to urban and regional local governments to embed within strategic plans coherent actions and priorities, visions and principles for a mapped area and improve stakeholder food literacy. The collection of diverse councils driving the project was reflected in the outcomes of guides and tools with varying adaptability to individual council demographics.

The project steering group consisted of representatives from local and regional government, state government and local corporate businesses, bringing expertise from government administration, management, environment, community, strategy and planning. A wider network guided the tender process (local and interstate submissions) through to the evaluation of the project. Each step included working with businesses and not-for-profits local to the region, utilising diverse cultural influences and Indigenous connections for a broad summary of the mapped area.

The project has effectively developed a community of practice to address food system resilience across local and state governments. Monetary & In-kind support was provided from several governments and organizations, totaling a contribution of \$36,750 showing their commitment.

The City of Onkaparinga, City of Holdfast Bay, City of Marion, City of Salisbury, City of Charles Sturt, City of Campbelltown, City of Adelaide, Whyalla Council, Alexandrina Council and Mount Barker Council all contributed funding and support, calculated at \$16,500.

Green Adelaide, Wellbeing SA, the Heart Foundation, the SA Nutrition and Dietetics Network, Ethical Fields, Collaborative Futures, the Onkaparinga Food Security Collaborative, Healthy Cities Onkaparinga, the SA Urban Food Network, Adelaide Sustainability Centre & Conservation SA,

Sustain: Australian Food Network and the University of Sydney also provided in-kind support. These connections provided valuable insights and informed project direction.

The project engagement included a diverse range of food systems actors including local farmers and producers, other gardeners, food processors and distributors, food retail, general community, resource recovery, hospitality, education and business. This encouraged ongoing networking, for example visiting each other farms following the workshop.

Participation from various council departments, including economic development, strategic planning and strategy, community development and wellbeing, increased interaction and their awareness of the food system and what role they could play. One example is of the economic development and wellbeing teams at Alexandrina committing to link with the upcoming Agribusiness Forum.

Stakeholder engagement will continue with other councils and networks as the guide and toolkit are launched.
