

Encourage Speaking Using Thumb or Beach Balls

A thumb ball is a soft stuffed ball to throw, roll, or pass in a circle or randomly. Catch it! Look under your thumb. Respond to the prompt. Children, teens, and adults absolutely love this interactive tool that will get people moving, learning, talking, and .sharing

You may use thumb balls as ice breakers, to encourage speaking, dealing with different topics, preparing for the oral exam, assessment, etc.



Beach balls may be used for the same purposes.

Procedure:

- 1. Teacher throws ball to a student.
- 2. The student catches the ball and reads the prompt he touches with his right thumb.
- **3.** Student responds to the prompt and throws the ball to another student.
- 4. Activity repeats itself for 10-15 minutes.
