JongChul Kim is the founder and program director for the public interest lawyers' organization, Advocates for Public Interest Law (APIL) in Seoul. He holds an LL.M. from Korea Graduate University and an LL.B. from Korea University and obtained his Certificate in Law at the Judicial Research and Training Institute.

His work focuses on the rights of vulnerable migrants in Korea, including refugees, victims of human trafficking, and migrant detainees. He also specializes in business and human rights, and monitors human rights abuses committed by Korean companies Overseas.

In 2011-2012, he served as chair of the human rights department for the Korean Bar Association. In 2016, the Korean Bar Association awarded Kim with the prize for "Best Public Interest Lawyer." In 2018, Kim received the Trafficking in Persons Report Hero Award from the U.S. State Department.

Kim is currently a visiting fellow in Human Rights Program of Harvard Law School researching the rights of non-citizens by international human rights treaties.
