1. Font and Spacing

- ✓ **Typeface and Size**: Use *Times New Roman* throughout the manuscript.
- ✓ **Main Body**: Set the body text to 12 pt font size, with 1.15 line spacing, and fully justified.
- ✓ **Paragraphs**: Indent each new paragraph by 0.5 inches (1.27 cm) or, if you prefer not to indent, use a 6 pt spacing before each new paragraph.
- ✓ Margins: Maintain at least 1 inch (2.54 cm) of space on all sides (top, bottom, left, and right).

2. Length

- ✓ Word Limit: The manuscript should be between 5,000 and 6,000 words, not including tables, figures, and references.

- ✓ Place any recommendations—arising from the research and directly applicable to end users—immediately after the conclusion. Both the conclusion and the suggestions should be written in paragraph form and kept under 100 words.
