DIY Faithful Action: Loving Our Neighbor Community Engagement Checklist

Your church can express its solidarity with immigrants and advocate for their rights by holding a demonstration or other public witness. The Northern Illinois Conference's Commission on Religion and Race will hold a march on June 15 in Schaumburg to show its support and advocacy for immigrants. CCOR encourages churches to extend the witness by holding events in their communities.

Consider planning an event that works for their church while bearing witness to God's commandment to "love your neighbor as yourself" and acknowledging the humanity and dignity of our immigrant siblings.

Here are some steps to help you prepare for an action in your community.

Recruit a Planning Team

The team may consist of members from your church, nearby United Methodist churches or other houses of worship, and/or other community partners.

Decide what type of event your group should undertake. Possibilities:

- A prayer vigil (at church or elsewhere)
- Rally or march (at church or in the community)

Set a Date and Time

Suggestions:

- **June 15, 2026:** to coincide with the [NIC march](#) in Schaumburg during the Annual Conference session.
- **Sept. 13, 2026:** [NIC's Conference-Wide Faithful Action Day](#)
- June: National Immigrant Heritage Month
- June 20, 2026: International Refugee Day
- Any other time through Oct. 31, 2026

Determine a Location

Possibilities:

- A rally or march could be held as a faithful witness in front of the church, especially if it is in a prominent location in the community, or elsewhere in the neighborhood.
- If other groups are participating, all might meet at the same prominent location.
- Plan a prayer time at the church at the time of the march so that those with mobility limitations and others may pray for those who are walking.
- If you plan to meet in a public place:
 - Check with local authorities and ask if a permit is required.
 - Alert law enforcement of your plans.
 - Publicize your event immediately.

Publicize the Event

- Add the event to your church's communication platforms and announcements.
- Send a press release (find a sample press release [here](#)) and send it to your local news outlets.
- Personally invite church members and others in the community to participate. Encourage church members to personally invite friends and others they know in the community. This is the most effective way to build participation.
- Ask the church's clergy to preach on prophetic witness about immigrants and how our Christian faith and Wesleyan social activism call us to engage, support, and witness.

- Create your own posters. Be sure to include who, what, where, when, and why

What To Wear

Decide on how you'd like people to dress. A couple of options:

- For events right after worship, wear "Sunday best"
- T-shirts with the church's information or promoting support for immigrants
