

The Beginning of the Norse World

The three brothers then used Ymir's body to create the world. His flesh became the land. His blood became the deep oceans. His bones turned into mountains, and his teeth became stones and rocks.

To form the sky, the gods lifted Ymir's skull high above the earth. They placed four dwarves—North, South, East, and West—at the corners to hold it up. Sparks from the fires of Muspell were set in the sky as stars.

- Void (n) – A large empty space where nothing exists.
- Primitive (adj) – Belonging to an early stage of development; not advanced.
- Massive (adj) – Very large and powerful.
- Flood (n) – A large amount of water covering land.
- Carve (v) – To cut or shape something from wood or stone.
- Protective (adj) – Keeping something safe from harm.
- Crafted (v) – Made carefully with skill.
- Eternal (adj) – Lasting forever.
