<b>Full-time course load for exchange students per term/semester?</b>	Full-time course load for exchange students to be at least 3 courses (worth 3 credits each) per term at the undergraduate level and 3 courses (worth 3 credits each) at the graduate level.	A full-time course load is 10 - 15 credits worth of courses per semester.
<b>Maximum number of courses that exchange students can take per term/semester?</b>	Undergraduate exchange students may take a maximum of 5 courses (worth 3 credits each) per term. Graduate exchange students may take a maximum of 3 courses (worth 3 credits each) per term.	Exchange students cannot take more than 20 credits worth of courses per semester.
<b>Minimum number of courses that exchange students must take per term/semester?</b>	Incoming exchange students must take at least 1 course (worth 3 credits) per term.	Exchange students must take at least 1 course per semester.
<b>How is credit determined?</b>	<p>Most term/semester-long courses have a weight of 3 credits each. The 3 credits are equivalent to 3 hours of lecture per week for a 13 week period and thus equate to 39 total hours of lecture.</p> <p>Please note that UAlberta credits only take into account instructional time.</p>	<p>Credit is reported in terms of semester hours. 1 unit of credit equates to 1 lecture hour/week or 2 lab hours/week. Therefore, a course worth 2 credits has 2 lecture hours/week, or a 3 credit course has 3 lecture hours/week. The Fall/Winter terms are 16 weeks each, meaning that a 2 credit course only has 32 lecture hours in total and may not be recognized for credit unless it is combined with another 2 credit course by the Faculty. A 3 credit course has 48 lecture hours and definitely meets UAlberta requirements. If a student passes the 3 credit course and it fits in the overall degree program, credit should be granted.</p>

<p><b>How are courses numbered and what does the numbering system mean?</b></p>	<p><a href="#">Course numbering &amp; details</a></p>	<p>Tsinghua uses 8 character course numbers and then a corresponding course title. If the first character is: 0-4 or H-T, W - this is an undergraduate course. If the first character is: 6-9, A-G or X-Z - this is a graduate level course. They do not appear to differentiate between Year 1-4 courses and instead only divide them between undergraduate and graduate level.</p>
<p><b>When are course schedules for the upcoming school year and summer program season released?</b></p>	<p>Fall and Winter term course offerings are usually released to students by the end of March of the previous school year. Summer course registration is in February.</p>	<p>Course schedules for any semester are released a week or few before the end of the current semester.</p>
