1. Describe Roman housing.

The rich lived in large stone/marble homes with kitchens. Often has pools and elaborate dining rooms. The poor lived in cramped, small apartments. Did not even have a kitchen.

- 2. What did poor Romans eat for dinner? What did the rich eat? The poor ate simple meals of fish/figs/asparagus. The rich ate multi course elaborate meals.
- 3. What was the purpose of the Roman baths? It was a place for people to socialize and take baths. Think of it like the gyms of ancient times!
 - 4. How did Roman emperors prevent rebellion amongst the poor classes?

They gave them "bread & circus" (free food & entertainment) to keep them from rebelling

- 5. Why was currency import during the Roman empire? It allowed for the expanse of trade-Roman currency became accepted throughout most of the known world
 - 6. What does the term forum mean in Latin? Describe what this place was.

Public Place- it was were all the shops, temples, government buildings, etc were located.

7. What was the paterfamilias? Why was it important to Roman life? The oldest male head of the household. They made all important decisions.

Learning Target 2- I can describe key accomplishments of the Roman Empire.

1. What was the Pax Romana?

The 200 period of peace of prosperity that started with the reign of Augustus.

They tolerated them, UNLESS they viewed them as a political threat. Religions that were not tolerated were Judaism & Christianity.

l. Why did the Romans worship so many gods?
They weren't really sure which gods existed so if they liked gods from different culture- they would worship them in addition to the ones they already worshipped.

2. Around the time of the lst Century BC, how did the Jews feel about being ruled by the Romans?

They hated the Roman occupation of Jerusalem. They would rebel against the Roman rule. Rome would persecute them for this rebellion.

- 3. What marks the shift from B.C. to A.D.? or from B.C.E. to C.E.? The birth of Jesus of Nazareth
- 4. Why was Jesus arrested and crucified by the Romans? He was seen as a political threat to the empire. People were viewing him as the son of god, instead of the empire as "god." Many Jewish leaders also did not acknowledge him as the messiah and sided with the Romans to help eliminate him. He was killed by crucifixion because this was a common form of execution for political enemies of the state.
 - 5. Know the following concepts connected with Christianity:
 - Holy Trinity- concept of God the father, son, & holy spirit
 - Holy Communion-symbolic of the last supper and the sacrifice Jesus made for all mankind
 - Baptism-symbolizes the beginning of new life and Christ as the savior
 - Resurrection-belief that Jesus was raised from the dead and everyone else will be too that accepts Jesus as their savior
 - Salvation-belief that God will save people from their sins
