Welcome Messages

From the Cultural Studies Association President

I want to welcome everyone to our first virtual, digital conference. There are pros and cons to such a change. Many professional associations have abjured face-to-face annual events for some time, for environmental, monetary, and disability reasons; others favor the togetherness and potential for informal exchange provided by physical meetings.

We have been pushed towards this way of convening by the pandemic, itself an ironic and accidental incarnation of our theme, bodily sovereignty and collective action.

The idea of bodily sovereignty has found powerful expression since the War with the discrediting of eugenics, the emergence of international human rights, and a discourse of informed human consent, embodied most purposively in the Nuremberg Code, the Belmont Report, and the Helsinki and Doha Declarations. It has been mobilized in such areas as animal rights, feminism, and disability studies, inter alia.

Collective action has been an issue in politics and philosophy for centuries. It became a core element of what is now known as neoliberalism with the uptake of Mancur Olsen's condemnation of organized groups militating for mutual aid—the 'collective action problem.'

The complexity of bodily sovereignty is incarnated today in the struggle over how to conduct clinical trials for drugs to counter Covid-19 efficiently and effectively, and how to make and distribute any resultant vaccines. Opposition to collective action can be heard in such debates and felt in the pandemic's differential impact on particular social groups. Those outcomes derive inevitably from a predominantly private health system.

I hope to see you all "in" Chicago, where I'll learn more about these and related topics.

Many thanks to CSA Vice President Helen Kapstein, the various committees putting together the program and logistics, and especially to Michelle Fehsenfeld and Sean Andrews for their dedicated work.

Alexis Clements is a writer and filmmaker based in Brooklyn, NY. An alumna of the WP Theater Playwrights Lab, she has been awarded a Bruce and Arch Brown Foundation Grant, a Dramatists Guild of America fellowship, two Puffin Foundation Artist Grants, a Ludwig Vogelstein Foundation grant, the Source Theatre's Washington Theatre Festival Literary Prize, and she has been a resident at the Millay Colony. She is also founder of the multi-disciplinary arts project New Acquisition, which produced projects from 2007-2010, and a co-founder of the queer writing group and publisher, Private Commission, which was active from 2012-2017. Her creative work has been produced, published, and screened in both the US, Europe, and South America. Her recently completed feature-length documentary film, *All We've Got*, premiered in October 2019.

<u>Stephanie Murphy</u> is an assistant research social scientist with the Southwest Institute for Research on Women. She holds a Ph.D. in Gender and Women's Studies with a graduate certificate in Human Geography from the University of Arizona. She has worked on a number of research projects in the areas of community health, workplace diversity, and youth empowerment and is currently writing a book about the early history of women's basketball.

Toby Miller is Stuart Hall Professor of Cultural Studies, Universidad Autónoma Metropolitana—Cuajimalpa, Research Professor of the Graduate Division, University of California, Riverside, and Sir Walter Murdoch Distinguished Collaborator, Murdoch University. The author and editor of over forty books, his work has been translated into Spanish, Chinese, Portuguese, Japanese, Turkish, German, Italian, Farsi, French, Urdu, and Swedish. His most recent volumes are *How Green is Your Cell Phone?* (co-authored, 2020), *El Trabajo Cultural* (2018), *Greenwashing Sport* (2018), and *The Routledge Companion to Global Cultural Policy* (co-edited, 2018). *The Persistence of Violence and Violence* are in press.

Angharad N. Valdivia is Research Professor of the Institute of Communications Research and Department of Media and Cinema Studies at the University of Illinois. Author of *The Gender of Latinidad: Uses and Abuses of Hybridity*, *A Latina in the Land of Hollywood, Feminism, Multiculturalism and the Media*, *A Companion to Media Studies*, *Latina/o Communication Studies Today*, *Mapping Latina/o Studies*, and *Latina/os and the Media*, she edited *Communication Theory* and the *International Encyclopedia of Media Studies*.

Lynn Spigel is the Frances Willard Professor of Screen Cultures at Northwestern University. She is the author and editor of books and essays on TV and US culture, including Make Room for TV: Television and the Family Ideal in Postwar America (1992), TV by Design: Modern Art and the Rise of Network Television (2009), and TV Snapshots: An Archive of Everyday Life (forthcoming). She is the editor of the Console-ing Passions and Spin-offs book series at Duke University Press.

Helen Kapstein, incoming President of the Cultural Studies Association, is Associate Professor in the English Department at John Jay College, The City University of New York. She earned her PhD in English and Comparative Literature from Columbia University. Her book *Postcolonial*

Nations, Islands, and Tourism: Reading Real and Imagined Spaces was republished in paperback in 2019 by Rowman & Littlefield International. Her current work in petrocriticism is forthcoming in the collection Oil Fictions and has appeared in Postcolonial Text. Other work has appeared in various venues including Safundi: The Journal of South African and American Studies, English Studies in Canada, and, mostly recently, Ms. magazine.


Marian Aguiar, Carnegie Mellon University

Andrew Ross is Professor of Social and Cultural Analysis at NYU. A contributor to the *Guardian*, *The New York Times, The Nation*, and *Al Jazeera*, he is the author or editor of more than twenty books, including *Stone Men: The Palestinians Who Built Israel, Creditocracy and the Case for Debt Refusal, Bird On Fire, Nice Work if You Can Get It, Fast Boat to China, No-Collar, and The Celebration Chronicles.*

Jeffrey J. Williams writes on contemporary fiction, the history of modern criticism and theory, and the fate of American higher education, for public as well as academic venues. His books include *Theory and the Novel: Narrative Reflexivity in the British Tradition* (Cambridge UP, 1998) and *How to Be an Intellectual: Criticism, Culture, and the University* (Fordham UP, 2014). He has also edited the collections *PC Wars: Politics and Theory in the Academy* (Routledge, 1995), *The Institution of Literature* (SUNY P, 2001), *Critics at Work: Interviews 1993-2003* (co-edited; NYU P, 2004), and *The Critical Pulse: Thirty-six Critics Give their Credos* (co-ed., Columbia UP, 2012), as well as serves as one of the editors of *The Norton Anthology of Theory and Criticism* (2001; 3rd ed. 2017). From 1992-2010 he was editor of The Minnesota Review, for which he has conducted many interviews, including one with Paul Smith in ns 43-44 (1995). He is Professor of English and of Literary and Cultural Studies at Carnegie Mellon University, and during 2019-20 he was Distinguished Visiting Fellow at the Advanced Research Collaborative at CUNY Graduate Center.

Marian Aguiar is Associate Professor of English at Carnegie Mellon University. Her fields of expertise include culture and globalization, postcolonial studies, and feminism. She has a particular interest in the study of South Asia and the South Asian diaspora. Her most recent book, *Arranging Marriage: Conjugal Agency in the South Asian Diaspora* (University of Minnesota, 2018) looks at gendered cultural narratives produced in transnational contexts. She identifies how narratives about arranged marriage bear upon questions of consent, agency, state power, and national belonging. Her early research focused on mobility and modernity in South Asia. *Tracking Modernity: India, Trains, and the Culture of Mobility* (University of Minnesota, 2011), explores cultural representations of modernity by considering how the railway was imagined in colonial, nationalist and postcolonial South Asian contexts as a mobile space.

She has continued to work on both transnationalism and the imagination of movement with her current book project *Refugee Mobilitie*s and in her capacity as co-editor of the Palgrave McMillan book series Studies in Mobilities, Literature and Culture.



PhD in Cultural Studies

The doctoral program in Cultural Studies at George Mason University, founded in 1994, was the first program of its kind in the United States. Core faculty and affiliates from more than a dozen other departments ensure that the work fostered in our program is genuinely interdisciplinary, even as all our students are trained in common strategies of rigorous cultural critique. Methods are drawn from Marxist political economy, aesthetics and formalism, film and media studies, social theory, Foucauldian discourse analysis, critical race studies, and gender studies. The aim of the program is to encourage students to produce socially useful knowledge, whether of formations from the past or the present, that affords fresh insights into the current socio-political conjuncture.
